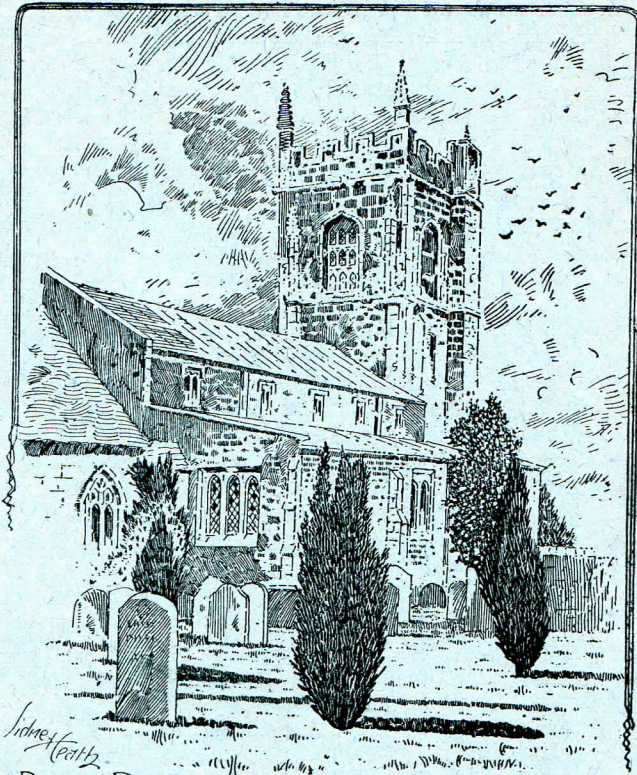

AT THE CHURCH.

The members of the Foresters' Friendly Society are much to be congratulated on the excellent organization of the Club walk and Hospital collection, on the Sunday preceding Woodbury Hill Fair. The sum of money gathered for the Dorchester Hospital amounted to over £12. It was fortunate that Mr. Legge had arranged to spend that Sunday among us: he preached at all three services, and had a packed Church to address in the afternoon. The evening turned out misty and damp, so the open-air lantern service on the Hill had to be given up. The Hospital letters have been placed in the hands of Mrs Bemister and the Vicar.

The Harvest Festival was held on the last day of September. Mr. Brown, of Affpuddle, was the preacher. The anthem, "Sing praises," by *Gounod*, was well sung. The decorations were as tastefully done as they always are at Bere. Four dozen large red earthen-ware vases had been purchased from a pottery at Verwood: these took the place of the pickle jars on the pillars, and were stood in the windows. It seems generally agreed that they were a successful innovation. A lady motorist, who visited the Church about that date, wanted to purchase the lot.

On the 18th of October, Mr. Batty, Diocesan Secretary of the Church of England Temperance Society, talked to the children in the afternoon and preached at Evensong. The weather was bad, but the congregations good.

THE CHOIR OUTING.

October the 5th, 1908, will be a day long re-

membered by those who joined Mr. Edgson's excursion at Wareham, at 8.40 a.m. The original idea for this year's choir outing had been to pay Mr. Plunkett a visit on his man of war, but he was removed from Portland during August, and therefore had to withdraw his kind invitation. He became our host, though not present, at the White City instead, for he sent a cheque to cover the meals. The only hitch during the day was the late arrival of the train at Waterloo Station. This robbed us of our intended 'bus drive from the City through the West End. As it was the party saw Westminster Abbey, and St. Paul's inside, and the Houses of Parliament outside, and a little of the business part of London, but passed through the more fashionable quarter too far below the surface of the earth to see anything except advertisements. The attractions were sufficiently numerous to provide continuous enjoyment from 3.0 to 11.0 p.m. Several Bere Regis people were in London, and came to the White City to see familiar faces in a strange place.
