SUNDAY SCHOOL.

CHOIR OUTING.

It was not a good time of year for the collection, as the services during the hot August days have not been over well attended, but an excellent time for the outing. The Choir held a meeting and elected to go to Weymouth, where ten hours were spent on August 6th. It was a brilliant day, and excellent meals were served at Lumley's Restaurant. The whole excursion was thoroughly enjoyable, but not so novel or exciting as Cheapside and the White City.

Choir practice will re-commence on Friday, September 17th, at 6-30 for the boys and 7 for the adults. We hope for good attendances right through the winter, as there is plenty of good music at the Vicarage waiting to be learnt.

THE SCHOOLS.

Certain changes in the staff will take place on the 2nd of October. Miss Malpas is leaving the Girls' School at Shitterton on that date, and her place will be taken by Mrs. Hallam. The new Head Mistress of the Bere Heath School is Mrs. Satchwill, who comes from near Liskeard in Cornwall. Her husband, who has recently died, was Head Master of the Pensilva Mixed School, in the parish of S. Ive. Mrs. Satchwill, who has been teaching some eight years in the Pensilva School, is forced in consequence of her husband's death, to find a new sphere of work. She has three children. The Heath School has gone forward under Mrs. Hallam's supervision, and we trust that the new mistress will carry on her excellent work.

HARVEST FESTIVAL.
