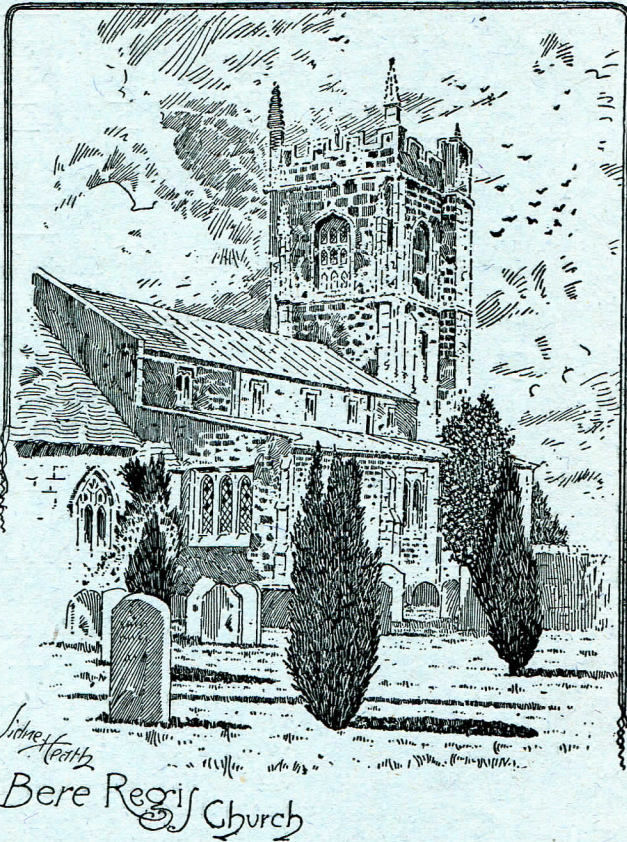

These arrangements follow the programme of last year. The Vicar understands that the Easter Day morning services were generally approved of last year, and so he proposes to repeat them. As he has to celebrate at Kingston, at an hour which is convenient there, he cannot begin the midday service before 11-30, which means that the whole Service would be over inconveniently late for many, if Morning Prayer and the Communion were taken together. He has talked the matter over with his colleague, and they feel that last year's arrangements had best be adhered to. There will be two clergy to administer at the 7-0 and 8-0 o'clock Communions. We are sorry that the Confirmation candidates will not be able to make their first Communion on Easter Day. So far the week night Lenten Services have been excellently attended, and the fact encourage us to look forward to a well kept Easter.

## AMATEUR THEATRICALS.

On February 1st a Dramatic Entertainment was given at the Drax Hall, in aid of the Funds of the District Nursing Association.

Three short plays were acted—and acted uncommonly well—by Messrs. Ralph Radclyffe, Fred Jesty, Gerald Johnson, Miss Radclyffe, Miss Grace Radclyffe, Miss Thomas, Miss Leighton, Miss M. Smith-Marriott, Misses R. and T. Bedford, Miss Dorothy Johnson, and Miss Dorothy Bemister.

Though most of the company had never acted before, they all, without exception, appeared perfectly at their ease, and lacked that self-consciousness and shyness which is usually so noticeable in the young amateur. They also spoke distinctly, so that every word could be heard. They refrained from meekly addressing remote corners of the stage with their backs to the audience, and their hands appeared as useful appendages to their arms, and not, as so many amateurs find, an uncontrollable string of digits performing foolish antics in every awkward way. Among so many good performers it is perhaps unfair to select one as being better than the others, but among a company conspicuous for its good fellowship, none will grudge an extra word of praise for Miss Bemister, whose rendering of Mrs. Lovibond was exceptionally clever. She acted the part all the time she was on the stage, and remained Mrs. Lovibond without once relapsing into Miss Bemister. Among

the male actors Mr. Ralph Radelyffe deserves praise in his character of "Teddy Lawless." He played with great spirit and animation.

The plays were entitled "Mollie's Mistake," "Petticoats and Politics," and "A Catastrophe." The first two were written by Mrs. Baker White, and the third by a young lady, whose name was not given. But whoever she is she should for the benefit of the long-suffering amateur actor, produce a few more plays in the light clever vein of "A Catastrophe."

Much praise and many thanks are due to Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Bere for the splendid manner in which the whole entertainment was organized. They had much to think of and to arrange for weeks before the performance, and owing largely to their experienced management everything went off without a hitch.

Under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Baker White an excellent stage and scenery were erected by Messrs. C. House and Griffin. To the last two named great praise is due for their excellent work in setting up and making the scenery, which shows that the British country-workman is a capable and clever man—second to none. The Hall was generously lent, without charge, by Lady Dunsany. Mr. Profeit, Mrs. Johnson, Miss Besant, and Miss D. Kellaway aided the good cause by delightful songs and piano-forte music between the plays.

To emphasize the fact that the play was got up in aid of the Nursing Association's Funds, two Tableaux were given, representing the possible, though perhaps hardly probable, helplessness of a mother, when her child has met with an accident, and the comfort and consolation a trained nurse is under the circumstances. Mrs. George Lys very kindly undertook the part of the helpless mother—a rôle very foreign to her nature—while little Dolly House impersonated, with a child's aptitude for acting, the injured one.

In the second Tableau nurse Gregory came to the rescue in fine style, and with bandage and basin, gave a realistic picture of what training can do in an emergency.

The sum realized by the performance was £11 2/-
