BERE REGIS MOTHERS' UNION.

On March 29th a service was held in the Church at which twenty-seven members were present.

WINTERBOURNE KINGSTON ALLOTMENTS.

Since September, 1926, the Parish Council have been negotiating with the Whatcombe Estate for the purchase of the Allotments situated on the Whitechurch Road. The idea of purchase was first mooted when the Council met Mr. Downs, the Estate Agent, in the allotments, and asked to be allowed to give up about five acres. The population has decreased since the allotments were first laid out, and the Council have experienced great difficulty in securing tenants for the whole sixteen acres, in fact several plots have been lying derelict for some time. Mr. Downs agreed, and suggested that the Council might like to purchase the eleven acres, and on being asked what the Estate would ask for same said he thought about £20 per acre. At a subsequent meeting of the Council the matter was gone into thoroughly and it was decided to write Mr. Ferris, the Director of Agriculture. Mr. Ferris kindly furnished full particulars as to how the money could be raised, and a parish meeting was called in September last, and the Clerk of the Council explained the whole matter to the parishioners assembled; after which a resolution was passed unanimously instructing the Council to proceed with the purchase afd to borrow the necessary funds from the Public Works Loans Board. The matter is now practically settled and the allotments have become the property of the village as from the 1st of October last. The Council have decided to keep the rents as at present, but hope to be able to reduce them in the near future.

WINTERBOURNE KINGSTON PUBLIC FREE LIBRARY.

The Dorset County Council has opened a branch of the County Library; to this the Women's Institute has added its own Library, for the benefit of the village.

The Library is housed at the Women's Institute Hut, and is open for the issue and exchange of books (from both Libraries) from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. every Friday.

The Library is managed by a Committee appointed by the County Council. Mr. F. H. Carlton is Librarian.

WINTERBOURNE KINGSTON READING ROOM.

The Reading Room has passed through a very successful year. There has been increased membership and more attendances at the Room. Early in the year the Committee purchased a small billiard table and this has proved a great attraction to the men, also it is a help to the Room financially. The Committee are very grateful to those ladies and gentlemen who so kindly provided magazines and periodicals for use in the Room again this year. The year finishes with a very substantial balance in hand.
