



Our Mission:

I have often thought that we have the media – the newspapers and broadcasting services we deserve. I write this as the fracas over the News International Corporation's alleged behaviour over 'phone hacking has started to result in resignations of not only their senior management staff but even, honourably, the Commissioner of London's Metropolitan Police. But I wonder if we too are in some ways culpable in that the News of the World had the highest circulation of any British newspaper and arguably the most profitable because its stories were often salacious and sometimes prurient and nearly always titillating. Millions of people wanted to read about other peoples troubles and escapades especially of so called personalities who were vacuously 'famous for being famous' and nothing or little else or they may have been mighty but fallen. But there were occasionally legitimate investigative stories – for example the corruption in match fixing by some players in Pakistan's national cricket team. But as News International's own statement said "The News of the World was in the

business of holding others to account. It failed when it came to itself." It's founding purpose and principle they claimed was that their newspapers should be a positive force in society – I wonder if the 'News of the World' was ever that, at least in recent times? The final reason for its demise was the significant loss of advertising revenue as advertisers no longer wanted to be associated with a publication of a



seriously and increasingly dubious reputation.

Now it is very easy for us to feel superior about the popular tabloid newspapers the 'red tops' whose generally very short stories and reports compel them to seek the sensational rather than the accurate or the legitimate. There is to be a major judicial enquiry into the criminal behaviour of those who 'hacked' into the private grief of many people from the Royal Family to allegedly our Armed Forces and victims of crime and we have to await the findings. Sustaining the popularity of a newspaper or any other medium is no excuse for criminal behaviour. For me the really interesting question is who determined what was in the public interest, and how did they loose sight of their moral compass? Indeed, did they ever have one? What made the journalists and their managers believe they were above the law, which in a democratic society we all sign up to? The judicial enquiry into all this mayhem may yet be the rallying call to a more responsible management of our media. The moral imperatives provided by our faith through the Bible and the Church and our teachers and Schools that we should *love our neighbour* as ourselves – never seems to be more appropriate.


On a different tack I want to thank all those kind and willing helpers who worked so hard earlier this summer at our Church Fetes, both in Affpuddle and Bere Regis, at our Duck Races and all the fund raising efforts that help us stay alive and look after our buildings and pay our bills. The reality is that we are not paying all our bills in either of our Churches and we need to increase our income if we are to remain alive as Churches in our communities. 





With the help of John England and his violin, it will be 'service as usual'. Why not come along to Evensong and hear John play – he received well-deserved applause for his voluntaries, last year!

Instrumentalists, playing at Church services, were the norm at one time and with our Thomas Hardy connections, it couldn't be more appropriate than at Our Church. It would be great if we could form a small band to play at the occasional service – very Hardyesque! If you know anyone, of any age, who would be interested in playing, please give me a ring.

Of course, if we could find another organist to help us, that would be just great. We are fortunate to have a good organ, which needs to be played. Any keyboard player, who might be interested and would like to try out the organ, please let me know.

Stepping outside Our Church, the wildlife area in the Churchyard now has some shade-loving plants, such as foxgloves, primroses and violets establishing. There are teasels flourishing against the wall and we have a small wild flower meadow, a log pile for insects, nesting box and even a bumblebee hotel. The Dorset Wildlife Trust's *Living Churchyards* judges visited and congratulated us on what we had achieved and gave us lots of ideas to take it forward. I think good progress has been made.



As I write this in mid-July much of the churchyard is a picture, as low-growing perennial wild flowers such as clover, vetches and self heal are blooming and are



covered with bees. It proves that we don't need to stop mowing the churchyard – leaving it uncut for a while in mid summer will really provide a lot of colour and will not look messy as long as neat edges are tight mown particularly along the path edges. We just need to give these plants, which provide valuable nectar for bees and other insects, a chance to flower at a time of the year when the grass is not growing fast, anyway.

Dorset Historic Churches Trust Ride and Stride 2011 - Saturday 10th September

Has your church benefited from a grant or loan from the Dorset Historic Churches Trust – or might it need help in the future? Why not take part in the Dorset Historic Churches Trust Annual Ride and Stride event. Not only can you raise money for the Trust, but you can nominate the church of your choice to receive half of your sponsorship.

Last September's Ride and Stride event raised £55,798. Although below the £62,176 raised in 2009, 2010's outcome was in line with the National result down 9% and comparable with the experience of other charities fund raising during the recession. Over 200 parishes and local communities took part in last September's event which raised a total of £55,798.

Lord Lieutenant of Dorset Mrs Anthony Pitt-Rivers, Bishop of Sherborne Rt Revd Dr Graham Kings, together with representatives from parishes across Dorset attended the annual Dorset Historic Churches 'Ride & Stride' celebration and presentation of the Morshead Trophy held in April at Poyntington.

The choice of venue was determined by the breath-taking achievement of the Reverend Canon Henry Pearson, Rector of Queen Thorne Benefice and Rural Dean of Sherborne. Henry's single cycle ride last autumn raised an all time

individual record sum of £3,025 which was divided equally between the Dorset Historic Churches Trust and All Saints Church, Poyntington.

For comparison, the four other best totals were Puddletown £1,565, Christchurch Priory £1,395, Winfrith Newburgh £1,171 and Sturminster Newton £1,162.

In recognition of his achievement Canon Pearson was awarded the Morshead Trophy for 2010,

BERE REGIS SURGERY PATIENTS PARTICIPATION GROUP SURVEY

The results of the survey have now been processed and a summary of the responses has been presented to the Practice. A meeting with the Patients' Participation Goup (PPG) and the practice was held on 7th July.

Two hundred and twenty-six completed forms were returned. This represented almost four hundred patients of various ages. More than half were over sixty years old: there were more than one hundred between twenty-one and fifty-nine years and less than thirty under twenty-one.

Since this represents approximately ten per cent of the practice's patients and is probably biased towards those who have most need of the surgery, the responses can only be taken as a guide of the overall performance.

The survey response indicated a good level of overall satisfaction with the performance of the practice's services but there were a number of comments expressing concerns: these included complaints about dispensing, privacy at reception and the dispensary and the lack of various speciality groups. A large number did not know that there was a newsletter available at the surgery.

How the practice communicates with its patients is an area which needs exploring.

AGNES MARY EASTMENT

"Mary" (as she liked to be known) was born on 3rd September 1924 and named Agnes Mary Allen. She was born at Bridge Cottage, Shitterton, Bere Regis. Mary was the eldest of 3 girls, sister to Betty and Margaret, sadly now both deceased.

Mary started school in September 1929 at "The new Rye Hill School" in Bere Regis. She was a model pupil with excellent reports being "Top of the Class" in all subjects studied. She left school in July 1938 at the age of 13 years and 10 months and went into Domestic Service at Broadstone and Parkstone. She later returned home after being taken seriously ill. Later, when recovered, Mary returned to domestic service with the Anderson family on the outskirts of the village, where she was taught to cook with Irish recipes and techniques by Mrs Anderson. Mary also worked at Bovington Camp for the M.O.D, R.E.M.E, repairing armoured military tracked vehicles.

Mary was married on 9th November 1946, aged 22, to Robert William Eastment (known as "Bob"). They moved into number 46 West Street, to set up home, where they had 3 sons David, John, and Michael.

Mary juggled motherhood with keeping house and supporting her husband Bob with his large vegetable allotment, including helping to prepare produce for exhibition in local flower shows and prize competitions, of which he won many. Additionally she helped care for various sick neighbours in their own homes during periods of their illnesses.

Mary was a very valued neighbour by many people who lived nearby. Heather told me that Mary was always kind and interested in Heather's young family and Gill, who lived nearby for several years, told me that Mary was someone to whom she could turn when she needed a shoulder to cry on.

She was also a very keen and fond advocate of village life, getting involved with many activities, which included being a committee member of the village Youth Club.

She was also a regular and faithful member of the congregation of this church for whom she delivered the magazines and helped at church fetes and other events. She belonged to Autumn Leaves and the Age Concern group where she was always a willing helper. She was a valued member of the Mothers' Union for many years and was a reliable banner carrier. Many of

our current members remember her with much love. In her spare time Mary enjoyed local whist drives and quizzes.

When the grandchildren were born (Christopher, Wesley, Rachel and Andrew) she enjoyed baking cakes and having family Sunday teas, which usually ended with a "Good old fashioned" game of cards, or two!

Aged 61 Mary was widowed in 1985, losing Bob to ill health. Mary filled her time with family correspondence and news, keeping the family together, cooking meals and entertaining family and friends. Other activities included supporting Michael's business, including hand written bookkeeping and VAT (which she continued to do right up until the end of 2010!!). She enjoyed accompanying him on some of his jobs, travelling in his van, from where she could admire the flowers, fauna and wildlife en route. She would patiently read or knit whilst waiting for Michael to finish his work.

Much later after suffering a serious fall whilst out in the garden, she withdrew into the house, where she continued to support Michael's business, keeping house and amusing herself with reading, daily crosswords, knitting and watching television, which included Sport, Quizzes, News and current affairs. She was always happy to welcome visitors in (of whom there were many!!) for tea, cake and conversation. She was a very good listener + confidant, a loyal and faithful friend to many.

Being a very generous, kind and caring woman, Mary would share her every last penny she had with many various charities and needy causes, regularly filling envelopes with cash and cheques to help "those poor people who are less fortunate and suffering" than herself.



A VIEW FROM THE LOFT

"Salmagundi musicae" by a peripatetic organist

Tomas Luis de Victoria (Vittoria)

This year marks the 400th anniversary of the death of the Spanish composer Tomas Luis de Victoria, who was born in Avila (Old Castile), c.1548/9. After a phenomenal musical career, he died in Madrid in 27th August 1611. He was a choirboy at Avila Cathedral. and when his voice broke (in 1565, we are told) he was sent to the Jesuit Collegio Germanico in Rome. During his time there it is probable that he had contact with Palestring, who was maestro di cappella at the Seminario Romano nearby.

In 1569 Victoria became cantor and organist at the Aragonese church of St. Maria di Monserrato in Rome. He retained these posts until 1575. From 1571 he also taught at the Collegio Germanico, where he was moderator musicae from 1575 until 1578, and in addition he held the post of maestro di cappella at the Seminario Romano, Besides these positions, he provided music for occasional services at the other Spanish church in Rome, St. Giacomo degli Spagnoli, and for the associated "Archconfraternity of the Resurrection". However, much of Victoria's professional activity in Rome was as a priest rather than as a musician. He was ordained priest in 1575, and supported by income from benefices in Spain. he was a chaplain at St. Gerolamo della Carita from 1578 until 1585.

Victoria's Roman years - he was there for so long that his name became "Italianized" to 'Vittoria' - were prolific ones for the publication of his music. In 1572 he published his first volume, a collection of motets including many of his bestknown works, and between 1576 and 1585 there appeared seven more printed collections of his sacred music, containing masses, hymns, Magnificat settings, music for Holy Week (including settings of the Passion, Lamentations, and responsories), psalms, and motets. In 1583, he dedicated his second book of masses to King Philip II of Spain, and indicated in the preface that he now wished to return to his native country. The king recalled him and he left Rome at some time around 1585-7. Philip made him chaplain to his sister, the Dowager Empress Maria, at the Convento de las Descalzas Reales de St. Clara in Madrid. Victoria held this office until her death in 1603. He was also maestro de capilla at the convent, and remained as organist until his own death eight years later.

In 1592 he again visited Rome, where he published another book of masses. In 1600 a magnificent collection of his masses, Magnificat settings, motets, and psalms was issued in Madrid. Devoted mainly to polychoral works, the volume includes three pieces which were among his most popular masses: the Missa pro victoria (a battle mass based on Janequin's chanson La Bataille), and the Missa 'Ave reaing coelorum' and Missa 'Alma Redemptoris mater' (based on his own

A notable characteristic of the masses published from 1592 onwards is their brevity (on which Victoria himself remarked regarding the 1592 collection). Likewise frequently concise, and with a highly concentrated expressivity of textsetting, are such works as the G. SCHERMER'S CHRISTMAN CHORAL MUNIC, No. 0888

Victoria's modern reputation long rested on a handful of motets such as *O magnum mysterium*, *O quam gloriosum* (see below), *O vos omnes*, and Vere languore, on the Tenebrae responsories, and on the Officium defunctorum. He wrote no secular music whatever.

Music by Victoria, including "O quam gloriosum", can be heard at the Milton Abbey Music Festival, at the 11am, 1662 Eucharist, at St Catherine's Chapel, on Monday 29th August. The Milton Abbey Music Festival runs over four days, Friday 26th August to Monday 29th August, in the Abbey itself, at St Catherine's Chapel (on the hill above the Abbey), in Milton Abbas Church, and in Milton Abbey New Barn Theatre. Other composers represented during the Festival include Bach, Brahms ("German Requiem"), Charpentier ("Te Deum"), John Ireland, Sir Edward Elgar, Mozart ("Eine kleine nachtmusik"), Gershwin (plus other jazz composers), Holst, Liszt, Lotti, Monteverdi, Pergolesi, Ravel, Purcell, and Charles Wood.





who starts as a naïve boy, displaying a mixture of innocence and arrogance, and ends up as a man refined by testing circumstances but exalted to a position of enormous power and prominence. In other words the everyday activity of learning to live and share together as a family. Most of us can identify with these difficulties. Indeed you may well be going through some family crisis as you read this. What we want to leave with the youngsters, especially the older group who will be with us, is a set of values that will hopefully help them in making decisions when they face similar difficulties.

The reconciliation and moving reunion that takes place between Joseph and his family in the Bible story was only possible because of God's intervention. Joseph held on to his faith in God when in was sorely tested – even when he was at His lowest point as he was wrongfully imprisoned the testimony of scripture reminds us, "God was with Joseph".

No one said family life would be easy. The saying is true that says you can choose your friends but you can't choose your family! At a time when family life and family structures are coming under increasing attack in our modern we need to get back to basics and look to the good and sensible advice given in God's Word. Of course that does mean we have to concede that we don't know it all and therefore need to put our trust in the wisdom of the one who created the family unit – God Himself. My pastoral experience of village life would suggest that many are still trying to work things out in their own strength.

Which is why I would implore you to follow the example of Joseph and put your trust firmly in the God of the Bible. Through Jesus Christ God is only a prayer away. Why not bring each member of your family to God in prayer. If need be tell him about not only the good things but the problems you encounter. Parent under pressure? – tell God about it! Fed up with your brother or sister? – tell God about it! A problem shared with God is not just a problem halved – it can often be a problem solved.

May God bless and encourage you in your family life.







Some TIPS FOR SHOWING VEGETABLES AND FLOWERS

Read the Schedule carefully and only put in exactly what is required. If it says three that is what is needed. Nothing more nothing less. Try to ensure that your choices are of good size, shape and colour. Choose vegetables that do not have blemishes caused by pests or diseases. Choose three potatoes that look the same and are uniform. No good putting in the biggest potato if the other two are much smaller. It is not always the bigaest that wins. I can remember putting in huge beetroots one year to find the judge did not like them at all as beetroot should not be bigger than a cricket ball.

Clean the vegetables carefully. Tie the tops of onions up with raffia or fine thread or string. Cardboard rings can be used to stand them up in. Carrots and Parsnips beetroot should have the foliage trimmed to 75 cm. All peas and beans must be displayed with a stalk attached. Tomatoes and soft fruits must be displayed with calyces (green bud case)

Flowers again are judged on colour, form,

condition, and freshness. If you can remove diseased or damaged petals but the judge may spot this if you over do it as it will affect the overall appearance of the flower. No seed heads or berries are accepted and surplus leaves, diseased or damaged leaves should be removed. Again read the schedule carefully only show what is required.

It is mostly common sense. Please have a go. We look forward to seeing a big entry this year.






