





### Steeple Keeper

As I write this I can see a tall figure bobbing about between the castellations atop the Church tower, forage cap silhouetted against the setting sun. Adrian is lowering the flag of St. George, then raising the huge Diocesan flag which will greet the Parish at the dawn of Easter Saturday.

Adrian is our 'Steeple Keeper', which is bellringer-speak for the one who looks after all the working parts of the bells, belfry and tower. Why, you might ask, do we have a 'Tower Captain' but a 'Steeple Keeper'? It's a good question and if you find the answer, please let me know.

Bell ringers are not the only ones to have strange terms and a language to themselves. Ask the brothers running the shop formerly known as Spar and they will tell you of butchers' slang. The Navy has its own slang called 'Jackspeak' and it turns out that Reverend Canon Ian is well versed in same. I dare not put into print the name by which he refers to the one who raises and lowers the flags; suffice to say that the shortened form of it is 'Bunts'. I know, however, that the vicar is very appreciative of Adrian's flag-flying – appreciative of what it entails.

There are 100 steps spiralling up to the tiny and perilously sited hatch giving access to the tower roof. Adrian has size 12 feet: the final steps are size 3. The tower roof is sloping, lead-sheathed and very slippery when wet, even more slippery when one of those wonderful swathes of Starlings has decided to roost there overnight after an afternoon get-together on the Mulberry fruits. But come rain or shine, storm-force winds or balmy evening (when it is a privilege to look down over the village), Adrian will be there when the flag needs attention. There are 12 recurring occasions during the year when a flag change is scheduled, from Armistice Day, *Union Flag* to Christmas Day *Diocesan Flag*, to Trafalgar Day, *Navy White Ensign* (ssh, don't ask!). In addition the usual flag of St. George is changed to a smaller one in high winds and struck completely when storm force winds are expected.

Yet 'Flags' is only a small part of the Steeple Keeper's job. Drop down 50 steps from the tower roof and you find yourself in the belfry, where the 6 great bells swing within a steel frame set into the walls of the tower. The bells themselves date from 1602 to 1919 and weigh between 340kg and 947kg. So you can imagine that

and Shop Association)

Also, in 2002, we were accepted into the Sainsbury's SAVE scheme, (Sainsbury's Assisting Village Enterprise). This allowed us, along with many other Community shops around the country, to sell Sainsbury's 'own brand goods'.

Very gradually there was a noticeable improvement to the interior of the shop when new shelves and a more modern freezer and fridge. Were installed. So the variety of goods on sale increased fast. Artists who lived in the village supplied cards depicting local scenes and our very own potter provided a lovely display of her beautiful pottery.

Fruit and Vegetables were always a problem because the shop was not cool enough to keep them fresh. A chiller has now been installed which has made a considerable difference.

In 2010, the shop received the first annual 'DORSET PEOPLE 'S PROJECT AWARD' which was a big pat on the backs for the 30 and more volunteers who have made the shop what it is today--continuing to serve the village as it has done for over 60 years as well as providing a place for villagers to meet each other and have a chat.

### **BRIANTSPUDDLE VILLAGE SHOP**

### The Story since 1997

Many moons ago, back in the 1990s, Briantspuddle Village Shop was located near the Crossroads in the village. It had been trading there for over 50 years, selling everything from

cooked hams to paraffin. There was a Post Office in the shop too, and, as an added amenity, the Post Box was outside in the wall and a Telephone Box across the road. By the 1990s the then owners wished to retire and ceased trading in September 1997. They sold the building and it became a private residence.

Losing the shop and Post Office was a blow to the village so a new location was urgently sought, and soon The Granary, adjacent to the Village Hall, was acquired with permission from the Parish Council. The fittings from the old shop were dismantled along with the Post Office counter, which was built using local bricks! They were trundled down in a small trailer to the new premises. This was an exciting time. The old shelves were soon stocked with basic supplies and a very small, very old freezer was donated. In fact most fittings were second hand in those days. The problem was finding staff to run the shop. The turnover was small and so were the wages so it was difficult to continue for long on these lines.

Then, in 2002 came the idea of a Community Shop run by volunteers - and what a brilliant idea that turned out to be! It needed a lot of organisation of course, but by this time the shop was recognised as an asset to the village and so people offered to work behind the counter, collect the daily newspapers, or work in the Post Office under a trained Postal worker. In fact the Post Office now offers a full service except for Motor Vehicle Tax. Quite an achievement. The shop was then registered as an Association (Friends of Briantspuddle Post Office

The Steeple Keeper has to inspect the ringing mechanisms regularly and for Adrian, that means once again fitting his substantial frame into very tight corners to look for any evidence of untoward movement or wear. He and his predecessors have kept everything working since 1919, the last time there was a major overhaul. Later in these articles, we shall see that the time has now arrived when we need to undertake another big overhaul to ensure that our church bells will be fit to ring out for a further 100 years.



Back now though, to the belfry. You've heard of bats in the belfry? Well, we've got Jackdaws! Adrian will tell you that looking after the bells is the easy part of his job - preventing *they evil varmints* from importing 5 kilo's of nesting twigs each week is what calls for real expertise. This year the 'n'daws seem to have new, well organised, deep-penetration, special-forces. The battle is really on!

So if you happen to see Adrian on Church Green gazing up at the tower and smiling gleefully at pairs of jackdaws as they peck hopelessly at the belfry shutters, don't call for the men in white coats.

Just tell him his steeple is looking wonderful!

### **Equity and Excellence – Liberating the NHS**

There are many concerns about the new NHS Bill, including the drive to use competition and have significantly more private sector involvement, but one thing the Bill recognises is the importance of General Practice. GPs will commission care for their individual patients and practice populations by prescribing, referring, admitting and co-ordinating their care. They will do this in association with their local Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), led by GPs and supported by good managers. The CCGs should be using practices as the first building block of care and services should be organised around a practice wherever possible, and if not, then around localities (eg West Dorset). Many of the services currently provided by Primary Care Trusts (PCTs) will be redistributed to CCGs, the local branch of the NHS Commissioning Board or a Commissioning Support Service (CSS). Our challenge is to keep our focus on our patients and ensuring that we continue to offer the finest quality of care here and to commission for them the finest quality of as care close to home as possible. The future is challenging!!

### Parish Heathland

We are fortunate enough in the Parish to have a wonderful Heathland on our doorstep and this is something we are keen to preserve. The Parish Council has decided to collect some historic information on the Heathland to protect the future of the site and to ensure that it is available for our residents to use.

#### **Bus Service 347 & 387**

Our County Councillor gave an update as to the current situation at County Hall with regard to the continuation of bus services 347 and 387 that serve the Parish. Dorset County Council has agreed to provide funding to the Damory bus company so that the full service will continue until 8th June. In the meantime the County Council will engage in a new procurement process in an attempt to secure a provider who will provide an on-going subsidised service.

A petition supporting the continuation of the bus services was placed in the village shop last month. In total 92 residents offered their support which represents a very significant proportion of Parishioners from our small community. This petition has now been sent to Miles Butler of Dorset County Council accompanied by a covering letter from the Parish Council setting out our concerns and urging the Council to continue the bus routes as the only public transport available to meet the needs of our rural parish. ### **Management of Tree and Hedgerow Issues**

Purbeck District Council have decided to progress with a joint working proposal option with the County Council which should provide a more complete and robust service.

The principal contact point will be Jenny Key who will provide technical administration support and will be based full time at Purbeck District Council offices in Wareham from 2<sup>nd</sup> April 2012. Professional tree advice will be mainly provided by James Bennett who will be based in Purbeck for two days a week (initially on Tuesdays and Thursdays) and will be able to deal with urgent issues and enquiries at other times. Further support will be available from the Dorset County tree team to cover emergencies and urgent enforcement issues when James is not available. James is already providing interim cover (e mail <a href="mailto:JamesBennett@purbeck-dc.gov.uk">James JamesBennett@purbeck-dc.gov.uk</a>) and can be contacted on 01929 557213 or 01305 228161. Delegated authority for signing off tree work applications and designation of new Tree Preservation orders will remain with the Planning and Community Services Manager and her first line management team.

### **War Memorial**

As many in the Parish will know the sculptor and artist Eric Gill was commissioned by Ernest Debenham to sculpt the "Madonna and Child" war memorial situated at the end of Bladen Valley. The memorial, made out of Portland stone, was dedicated by the Bishop of Salisbury on the day after the Armistice was signed in 1918. In recent times the Parish Council




has been the Custodian of the memorial and over the last year it has become increasingly obvious that essential repair work needs to be carried out. The Parish Council has a duty to maintain this listed monument and has worked closely with the Conservation Officer at Purbeck District Council to agree a schedule of works. ### "MAY DAY"

May Day is traditionally the 1st May, although for convenience today the celebratory bank holiday is held on the first Monday after that date (this year, 2012, on 7th May). It is not a feast officially recognised by the Christian church, its origins being distinctly pagan, but since the Reformation has been recognised as a special day at the beginning of the summer season. In the Church of England, in "quires and places where they sing" the tradition has grown up to greet the dawn with anthems and songs sung from the top of church towers. This is carried on today in a number of places (the last time in Bere Regis was 1989), but perhaps the best known venue is Magdalen College, Oxford (its chapel and choir of course being famous for the Oxford Movement and Catholic Revival of the 19th century), where is sung "The May Morning Hymn" by Benjamin Rogers (1614-98). It is sung at the top of the bell tower at 6am, usually attracting a large crowd who then go on to watch Morris dancing and to breakfast on the river; thus encompassing both Christian and pagan aspects!



The "festival" of May Day in Britain is a combination of ancient Roman and Celtic traditions. May, the fifth month of our modern year, was the third month of the old Roman calendar, and the name is probably derived from the goddess Maia. On May Day itself the ancient Romans used to go in procession to the grotto of Egeria (the "spirit" or "nymph" of a stream just outside the Porta Capena of Rome) in the grove of Camenae. May Day was in the middle of Floralia, the six-day festival of Flora, the goddess of flowers, held from 28<sup>th</sup> April to 3<sup>rd</sup> May (in our modern calendar). The celebrations included theatrical performances, music and dancing, and what we might translate politely from the Latin as a great deal of licentiqueness!

However, the month itself was regarded by the ancients as unlucky for marriages, owing to the celebration of the Lemuria, the festival of the unhappy dead! In mediaeval and Tudor England, May Day was a great public holiday. All classes of society were up at dawn and went "a-maying", not just on the top of church towers but around the countryside. Flowers and branches of trees were borne back in triumph to the towns and villages to decorate the houses, the centre of the procession being occupied by the maypole, decorated with ribbons and wreaths. As the sun rose the May Queen, a local young lady "of unblemished countenance and virtue", was crowned to joyful music and dancing around the maypole.

The scene is set in the madrigal – described on the title-cover as "a funn and bawdy musick" - "Now is the Month of Maying" by Thomas Morley (1557/8 – 1602). He was a respected church musician and composer, but despite his more serious calling was not averse to setting to music Orazio Vecchi's rather lewd text about what young people get up to in the Spring (the last verse-line particularly referring to outdoor "adult" antics!)

Now is the month of maying, When merry lads are playing, fa la, Each with his bonny lass Upon the greeny grass. Fa la.

The Spring, clad all in gladness, Doth laugh at Winter's sadness, fa la, And to the bagpipe's sound The nymphs tread out their ground. Fa la.

Fie then! why sit we musing, Youth's sweet delight refusing? Fa la. Say, dainty nymphs, and speak, Shall we play at barley-break? Fa la

The maypole was usually of birch, and set up for the day only; but in London and some major towns they were made of more durable wood and were permanent





# PURBECK DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

### **Terry Vine**

At a ceremony at Purbeck District Council's Offices in March volunteer of the year awards were awarded to good citizens throughout Purbeck. We took the opportunity to remember the sterling work Terry did



throughout his life. Below is the citation that was read out by Ian Ventham the Chair of the Parish Council.

Terry was totally dedicated to helping the needs of children and young people in his community and in wider Dorset. With his wife, Terry ran Bere Regis Youth Club, Lenny's, for many years. He organised several cars to take children and young people from Bere Regis to Blandford to go swimming. He raised money to buy canoes, taking them to local rivers to learn. He worked tirelessly to help others and was proud of the achievements of the young people in his village. Sadly, Terry died whilst on a trip to the Brecon Beacons where he had volunteered to take a group of youths hill-walking.

### The 347/387 Bus

At the April Council meeting I submitted an emergency resolution concerning the potential loss of the 347/387 bus service. The motion was debated and unanimously supported. Following this, representations will be made to Dorset County Council urging them to resolve the situation with the clear backing of Purbeck District Council. The motion is listed below and if it appears slightly daunting that is because I have to submit it in a particular prescribed format!

Notice of motion submitted by Councillor Wharf in accordance with Council Meeting Procedure Rules 10.1, 10.2 and 10.3:

"Purbeck District Council is aware that

- a). There is grave concern among many Purbeck residents at the potential loss of the Damory 347/387 Dorchester to Poole bus services through the villages of Affpuddle, Briantspuddle, Bere Regis, Bloxworth, Morden, Lytchett Matravers and Upton,
- b). These services were awarded to Damory Bus Company following an open, competitive tendering process whereby Damory were in a position to determine for themselves the revenue and cost profile of the services,

- c). Damory have nevertheless recently decided that the services are unprofitable and have therefore given notice of their termination,
- d). Damory originally intended to curtail the services in mid-April 2012, but have since agreed to their continuation until 9th June,
- e). The services represent a vital and, for some people, the sole link with work, facilities and amenities, such that their withdrawal would effectively isolate many people from hospitals, clinics, libraries, relatives, etc, and therefore calls upon Dorset County Council, as a matter of urgency, to find suitable alternative arrangements for the people who will be thus affected."

ships should proceed with caution. The Titanic, however, thought to be unsinkable, ploughed full speed ahead. This proved to be a fatal mistake and is certainly one of the factors that led to the disaster.

The story leading up to this tragedy points to a familiar trait in our human nature. In the early 1900s there was fierce competition between the shipping company Cunard and the White Star Lines to produce the ultimate in luxury liners, especially to woo the rich and the famous, who would spend lots of cash! There is always that desire to build something bigger and better! We have to be careful that we don't adopt a similar attitude today.

Jesus touched on this human weakness when he told the parable of the foolish man who built bigger and bigger barns! (Luke 12:13-21). He makes a telling point when He says, "a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions". There is nothing wrong with trying to improve or better something. There is nothing wrong with the right kind of ambitious attitude. And Jesus was not having a go at this man because he was successful and industrious. The point Our Lord was making here looks deeper into this man's motives. Having been blessed with an abundance of crops, he looks around for ways to store it up for himself. No acknowledgement to His Creator God who caused the crops to grow; no desire to share the fruit of his labours with his fellow man. Just a selfish desire to build bigger barns so that he could take things easy –' eat, drink and be merry' (v19). His life revolved around himself; he believed he could determine his life and his philosophy was to please self. No doubt if he were around today his favourite song would be Frank Sinatra's "I did it my way!"

But Jesus produces a godly punch line to the story! The man didn't have many years! His barns, his crops, even his soul did not belong to him – it belonged to God. "But God said to him, "You fool! This night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?" The old saying is true – "you can't take it with you when you go. Naked we come into the world and naked we leave the world." Forget Ryan Air and FlyBe – there is no baggage allowance in heaven!

Increasingly, in this materialistic consumerism age we live in, there is a constant danger of being distracted by offers of instant wealth, 'life-changing amounts' of cash and generally acquiring an inordinate amount of possessions and 'things'. # From opulence to arrogance

I am writing this page on the exact day (15th April) that one hundred vears ago the RMS Titanic sank after hitting an Iceberg on its maiden voyage from Southampton to New York. In a matter of a few hours nearly fifteen hundred souls perished. The ship had been declared 'practically' unsinkable by its designers and builders as the White Star Line launched its latest ship, declaring it to be 'the world's largest and finest liner' on posters and billboards. As it sailed out into the Atlantic some 2,228 people were on board.



For four days the ship's elite passengers revelled in the brand new amenities of the *Titanic ship*, replete with every modern luxury known at the time. Nothing had been spared to insure the comfort of the first class guests. But the ship was only equipped with 20 lifeboats, so that precious deck space for the first class passengers would not be taken up by bulky lifeboats. This was only enough to carry barely half the people on board

Down below, however, it was a different story. While the luxury liner teemed with a significant number of first class passengers, hundreds of second class and third class passengers survived the first few days of the voyage in cramped compartments. Most of these individuals were immigrant families who had scraped together every bit of money they had to travel to America aboard the grandest, and supposedly, safest ship ever built.

As the mammoth ship ploughed through the icy waters off Newfoundland, neighbouring ships in the area had reported earlier in the evening that the waters ahead contained numerous masses of solid ice and that approaching

### Fruit Loaf

- 3oz prunes
- 3oz dates
- 4oz walnuts
- 2eggs
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- pinch salt
- 4oz margarine
- 6oz soft brown sugar
- 4oz plain flour
- 4oz wholewheat flour
- a little milk

Cream fat and sugar add eggs, fold in flours and salt. Add prunes dates and nuts and a little milk to make a soft mix. Cook in a moderate oven for about 11/4 hours.

As I write this we have just had an interesting week on the wildlife front. We had a fascinating walk led by

Jon Cleave through Spears



Coppice kindly arranged by Kevin and Amanda Crocker. Jon was able to show us not only the impressive hedge laying work that he has done along the ancient trackway which runs alona the edge of the wood but also some most interesting wildlife. Jon explained how important these small coppices were to Bere Regis in former times. They really are part of our heritage. The bluebells were just coming up to their best and as

Our last talk for the season was by Adrian Bicker who explained how we can help monitor the wildlife around us by making 'Living Records' of what we see around us. This is becomingly increasing important as there is still so much loss of wildlife due to



development pressures all around us. He has now set up a Bere Regis Wildlife Group Living Record team. It is very easy for anyone who is interested to join in and set their own recording system up by logging in. Anyone who is interested please contact me - Tony Bates on 471563. It is surprising how much one does see - clearly there will be some problems with knowing what you see. There will be on opportunity to learn more from experts when we hold our second 'Bioblitz' on Souls Moor on Saturday June 16th. More about this in the June Parish Magazine.



### **Butter icing Filling**

- Butter
- Icing sugar
- Optional extra Half teaspoon orange rind and Tablespoon orange juice
- Sweet finely shredded Marmalade

### **Topping**

- Dusting of icing sugar or for a really rich cake
- 1 egg white
- 200 gram icing sugar
- 3 oz dessiccated coconut
- 1 tsp orange juice

Preheat oven to 180C or 350 F Gas mark 4. Grease two  $8^{\prime\prime}$  sandwich tins and line base with baking paper.

Place butter and sugar in a large bowl and beat together until light and Fluffy, gradually beat in the eggs. Stir in orange rind orange juice and soured cream. Fold in the flour and desiccated coconut evenly

Divide mixture between the two cake tins and bake in preheated oven for 35-40 minutes or until risen and firm to touch, Leave to cool in tin for 10 minutes then turn out and finish cooling on a wire rack.

Mix up Butter icing in the normal way for additional orange flavour add juice and rind. Put butter icing on one half of the cake and marmalade on the other and sandwich together

Either dust with icing sugar or for a really rich finish make frosting, Place egg white in bowl and beat lightly enough to break it up. Stir in icing sugar and desiccated coconut and enough orange juice to make a thick paste. Spread over the tope of the cake and sprinkle with toasted Shredded coconut and a few shreds of orange peel

#### BERE REGIS FIRST SCHOOL

We are very pleased to be able to announce that our Lollipop Lady has been saved!

As you may know, due to funding cuts, Dorset County Council had said that we would no longer be able to keep a School Crossing Patrol. Liz Gale who stands at the crossing on Rye Hill before and after school would have been made

redundant, and a very valuable member of the school team would have been lost.

Despite the crossing being part of the 'Safer Routes To School' initiative, and despite the fact that Liz wears a fluorescent green coat, and carries a 5ft Lollipop, there have still been several 'near misses' where drivers have refused to stop, even speeding up as they approached the crossing where children were waiting to cross. Unfortunately, the crossina still seems to be invisible to some drivers and the school community was extremely concerned that without our Lollipop Lady the way to school would be dangerous.



When we were informed that the funding would be cut, parents mobilized and began to write letters logging near misses and incidents regarding the crossing. The collection of letters was passed on to the County Council and the local Police were asked to monitor speeds on Rye Hill (which has a speed limit of 30mph up to just below 'Pampered Pigs'.)

In the absence of local authority funding, it became clear that sponsorship would be the only viable way to keep the crossing patrol – enter Mr Peter Mole, Quarry Manager of Aggregate Industries at the Warmwell Quarries who agreed to gather support from other quarries in the area to share sponsorship of the patrol. As the quarries are major users of the road, it seemed fitting that they would support the crossing patrol, and five local businesses (who have so far remained anonymous!) led by Aggregate Industries have joined together in an







This poem by the founder of the Reggio-Emilia approach to early education conveys the important roles imagination and discovery play in early childhood learning.

The child has a hundred languages, a hundred hands, a hundred thoughts, a hundred ways of thinking, of playing, of speaking.

#### A hundred.

Always a hundred ways of listening, of marvelling, of loving, a hundred joys, for singing and understanding a hundred worlds to discover, a hundred worlds to invent, a hundred worlds of dream.

The child has a hundred languages (and a hundred hundred hundred more) but they steal ninety-nine. The school and the culture separate the head from the body. They tell the child: to think without hands, to do without head, to listen and not to speak, to understand without joy to love and to marvel only at Easter and at Christmas.

They tell the child: to discover the world already there and of the hundred they steal ninety-nine.

They tell the child: that work and play, reality and fantasy, science and imagination, sky and earth, reason and dream are things that do not belong together.

And thus they tell the child that the hundred is not there. The child says: No way. The hundred is there.



## CBeebies TV series for children called Tree Fu Tom

Here is some information about a TV series that Dr Lynda Foulder-Hughes has been a consultant on. She has been involved in making it for the last 5 years and now it's finally ready.



It's called Tree Fu Tom and it has been launched on the BBC's children's channel CBeebies. It will be shown each day.

It is designed to help children between the ages of 4-6 years to develop foundation movements (the building blocks of movement) The target group are children with dyspraxia /developmental co-ordination disorder (DCD). It is hoped that by improving co-ordination and motor skills that children will be better prepared for school based higher level skills such as handwriting and PE.

It is an animated series using "big screen" animation for the first time on TV. The hero is a little boy called TOM who acts as a positive male role model on whom children can base their play. He enters a kindom in a tree at the bottom of his garden where movement performs magic. Whenever there's a dilemma Tom is the hero who performs a series of "spell movements" which are repeated twice. Tom encourages the children at home to copy the movement spells at the same time in order to make the magic work on screen, and to "save the day". It stars David Tennant and Sophie Aldred (who played Dr Who's assistant when it was Silvester McCoy).

Congratulations to Mel on achieving the Children and Young People's Workforce Level 3 Diploma. Mel achieved this through sheer hard work and determination when others would have given up. Very well deserved and well done Mel! This means that Tracy, Cindy, Mel and Mandy are all now Level 3 qualified.

Dame Clare Tickell's review of the EYFS recommended that Level 3 should be the minimum qualification standard for the whole early years workforce and Professor Cathy Nutbrown's current review of Early Education and Childcare qualifications is currently considering this point (full report due this summer). The benefits of a better qualified workforce with higher levels of qualifications are improvements in practice and better experiences and outcomes for young children, more children are getting a better start in life.

With Debbie at level 5 and currently studing the BA in Early Years , Ragamuffins is also on target to have a graduate led workforce by 2015.

Quality Improvement Audit 2010/12 visit by Dorset Early Years Team - February 2012

Every setting in Dorset receives a bi-annual Quality Improvement Audit visit to establish the level of support needed to ensure the setting offers high quality Early Learning and Childcare for children in the Early Years Foundation Stage.

At our recent visit by two members of the Dorset Early Years Team we were inspected on the quality of our early learning and our ability to meet the legal requirements and statutory guidance of the EYFS. As in our previous inspection, we have been rated at Level 1 which means that the Early Years Team consider our setting to be 'highly effective' and able to 'self-initiate appropriate support' as required.
