



Healthy Hilarity

It was amusing and uplifting to read again the other day, some words from Genesis.

"God has brought me laughter", said Abraham's wife, Sarah. And that laughter would have been infectious, for she then added, "everyone who hears about this will laugh with me!" And the reason for such hilarity? That God had promised Sarah, "well advanced in years" and "past the age of childbearing" a son by a husband who was himself a little matter of 100 years old! So she laughed when the promise was made, and she and Abraham laughed too, I'm pretty certain, when Isaac was born.

Very sadly, this world seems to be for many, less a joyous journey and more a problematic and tearful one. There's been human suffering beyond

comprehension through the continuing conflict in Syria, and in other war and terror torn places. To the cry, "Lord, how long?" there's no meaningful answer when hunger and thirst still affect so many people. The cruel hurricane, the destructive earthquake, the devastating flood, are all headlines for a day or two, until they're forced off the front pages, and away from our attention, by the trivialities of so-called celebrities' relationships, and sporting controversies. And so often, certainly in my life as a Priest, and frequently perhaps in yours too, ill-health and death seem to dominate life, as the phone rings and brings news of apprehension over a GP or hospital appointment, the death of someone we know, or a relationship that's broken down.

Against such a background, the God-given laughter of Sarah is indeed uplifting. It reminds us of the wonder of the joy, the surprise God had in store for her, and the new beginnings that brought her such heady glee.

In the lovely and very meaningful hymn, "Brother, Sister, let me serve you" we sing, "I will weep when you are weeping, when you laugh I'll laugh with you. I will share your joy and sorrow, till we've seen this journey through."

Caring for, and responding to, those for whom life is bleak and blighted, tense and tragic, is deeply embedded in our Christian faith. But it's equally important that Christianity proclaims the wonder inherent in being human. Within God's creative plan, he provided the capacity for goodness, creativity, inspiration, wonder and love. The Spirit of God which, in the creation story, "hovered over the waters", becomes, in the Christian story, the emerging Holy Spirit at work in the world, and in human beings.

And so where the Spirit is at work, "fruits of the Spirit" will evolve in glorious splendour—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against these things, Paul writes to the Galatians, "there is no law". Indeed, there's everything to be said for them!

There's a time to weep, and weep we will, with others, for others, alone. But thanks to Sarah and her heady and joyous glee, we are reminded that there's a time to laugh—and laugh we must.

Our health and well-being is helped by a generous and genuine helping of hilarity. It is in fact, as Sarah said, a gift from God.



still be required to apply for planning permission before commencement of extraction.

Trevor Badley is from the Dorset County Council Minerals and Waste Planning Policy Unit, which is the body heading the joint approach by the three Dorset Unitary Authorities. He gave a presentation at the July Parish Council meeting detailing local sites which have been put forward so far for inclusion. We are pleased to hear that Moreton Plantation has not been recommended for inclusion in the Mineral Sites Plan but two newly added sites, Hurst Farm and Station Road, both in Moreton, have been recommended for further consideration together with an extension to the existing Woodsford Farm Site at Crossways which will see the site come very close to our Parish boundary adjacent to Pallington. All these sites could have implications for the Parish due to HGV traffic density on the constricted sections of B3390 where they pass through the Parish.

There will be a further public consultation on the Mineral Sites Plan ending on the 23^{rd} September, anyone can make comments and details can be found on the Dorsetforyou website under the Dorset County Council Planning Policy section. A number of public exhibitions are being held throughout the county including one at Moreton Village Hall on Thursday 3^{rd} September from 3.00 - 7.00 pm.

The Parish Council will be responding and will be happy to hear representations from its residents on any issues in relation to this matter.

Dorset County Council want you to have your say about changes to the Mobile Library Service

Rural communities and those with no library service, as well as current users, are being encouraged to take part in Dorset County Council's mobile library service consultation, the consultation is open from 13 July to 4 September. Since 2008/09, use of the county council's mobile libraries has declined by over 35 per cent – with less than four people using the service in some areas and on average less than ten items issued per visit.

The county council provides a mobile library service to rural and outlying areas of the county, visiting over 250 locations by four mobile libraries. To take part in the survey, complete a form which will be available on mobile libraries or visit www.dorsetforyou.com/mobile-library-consultation

AFFPUDDLE AND TURNERSPUDDLE PARISH COUNCIL

Mineral Extraction

The Government requires all County Mineral Planning Authorities (MPA) to ensure that there is a certain land bank of minerals available to meet future demand within its plan period. This is a twofold process, the first part of which has already been completed for Dorset whereby "The Bournemouth, Dorset and Poole Minerals Strategy" was adopted by the three unitary authorities earlier this year following public consultation and subsequent approval by an Inspector.



This Strategy sets the volume of mineral required from land won, marine based and recycled sources and then goes on to set the criteria to be used to assess the suitability of any sites and mineral reserves that may be subsequently taken forward through the planning application process. The Parish Council made representations at all stages of the formulation of this strategy and gave evidence at the Public Inquiry, we were successful in ensuring that full protection for as yet undesignated areas which were highly suitable for nature conservation (namely Moreton Plantation in our case) was given at the same level as those nature conservation sites that had already been designated by Natural England. As a result of our representations this was subsequently included within the adopted strategy.

The MPA is now engaged in the second part of the process, where requests from landowners and mineral operators are put forward for sites to be considered for inclusion in a Mineral Sites Plan. This document is yet to be compiled following which it will be put to further public consultation and examination. All Candidate sites put forward will be carefully scrutinised through a statutory process and either recommended for inclusion or rejected as unsuitable. The MPA can only consider sites that are put forward with available minerals and a willing landowner; it does not suggest sites itself.




He also makes a very interesting point that the 'class divide' in not a financial barrier, it is one of inherited privilege. Orwell manages to convey that It is not the people but the conditions imposed upon them that make the classes:

"And then perhaps this misery of class-prejudice will fade away, and we of the sinking middle class ... may sink without further struggles into the working class where we belong, and probably when we get there it will not be so dreadful as we feared, for, after all, we have nothing to lose but our aitches."

The book group generally thought this book was a **must read**, although not everyone agreed that the book described the north or the plight of the working classes as it was, or agreed with the political viewpoint offered by the novel. Most of us had read Animal Farm and 1984 at school but had never forayed into Orwell's non-fiction works. What was really interesting was listening to members of the group reflecting on their own, or relate their parents or grandparents experiences of living in similar inner city environments. We found it difficult not to compare the conditions described in the book written 75 years ago with today's economic and social issue.

The first part we all agreed was easier to read as the social comment it makes is supported by Orwell's superb literary ability to paint pictures. To gain most from the second part, which is an academic essay on socialism and class, we felt needed a greater understanding of the issues within the context of the period when it was written.

A VIEW FROM THE LOFT

"AUGUST"

In the early Roman calendar this month was once called sextilis, as it was the sixth from March, with which the year used to open, but it was changed to Augustus in compliment to Augustus Gaius Julius Caesar Octavianus (63 BC to AD 14), the first Roman Emperor, whose "lucky month" it was. He was the adopted son of Julius Caesar (c.101 to 44 BC). 'Augustus' was a title rather than name, meaning 'revered' or 'venerable'. It was the month in which he entered upon his first consulship, celebrated three triumphs, received the oath of allegiance from the legions which occupied the Janiculum, reduced Egypt, and put an end to the civil wars.

The old Dutch name for August was Oost-maand (harvest-month); the old Saxon Wepd-monath (weed-month), where weed signifies vegetation in general. In the French Re-publican calendar it was called Thermidor (hot-month), which ran from 19th July to 17th August.

August, in 2015, will have 5 Fridays, 5 Saturdays and 5 Sundays. This happens only once every 823 years!

The working conditions down mines at the time were very poor, with low wages. They were only paid once they reached the coalface, they were not paid if the machines broke down, and even had to pay a hire charge for their lamps. Orwell's description of the problems faced by miners in washing after a shift, 'where every drop of water has to be heated up, in a tiny room containing the range, furniture, a wife and some children and a dog, there is not enough space' reinforces the class divide this book is highlighting.

Housing - he makes the point that the difficulty of getting hold of a house is one of the worst aggravations of poverty. There was a serious shortage of housing at this time for the poor and massive overcrowding, or as Orwell says "it means people will put up with anything, any exhortation of skinflint landlords, so long as the housing shortage exists the local authorities cannot do much to about it".

At this time coal production fueled industry and Orwell makes the observation that 'it is only because miners sweat their guts out that superior persons can remain superior'

Part 2. This second part is a long essay on his middle-class upbringing, and the development of his political conscience, especially questioning British attitudes towards socialism.

Orwell was middle class and jokes about his inability to lose his accent in the book.

BERE REGIS BOOK GROUP

The Road to Wigan Pier

The Road to Wigan Pier is a brilliant and bitter polemic about Orwell's experiences of working class life in the industrial north in the 1930s. A period just after the great crash where politically the country was seeing a rise in fascism and a decline in socialism and its values. The book has lost none of its political impact over time, and was cited recently as being a good description of Britain's current financial and class systems.


This is of course is not true. When Orwell described the conditions in the industrial north there was mass unemployment, low wages, zero hour contracts, poor social living conditions, high rents, minimal social mobility, lack of opportunity and the class divide was still perceived to be very large. Some have said that this book helped fuel the need for social change and the foundation of the welfare state.

Orwell was commissioned to write this book in early 1936 by publisher <u>Victor Gollancz</u> and spent two months living in the north from Birmingham to Sheffield. The book is written in two parts, the first part is his description of the condition of the working class whilst he lived amongst them. The second part is an extended

essay on socialism and the middle classes from his perspective.

GEORGE ORWELL
The Road to Wigan Pier

Part 1. Orwell lived in Wigan, Barnsley, Sheffield and Leeds. His longest stop was in Wigan, which is where the book starts, "the first sound in the morning was the clumping of the mill-girls clogs down the cobbled streets". He had the ability to write in a way as to enabled the reader to 'see' what he was describing. This ability is none clearer than in the chapters about his lodgings above the Brooker's tripe shop where he shared a bedroom with three other strangers -" the room had been turned into a bedroom by thrusting 4 squalid beds in among the other wreckage", and the painfully graphic description of the lives of miners and their wives.

OBITUARIES

Mr Arthur Whitty

Dad was born on a farm at West Chaldon 20 May1928, the youngest of 10 children.

His first job at 14 was delivering Bread for Farrells Bakery at Winfrith. Then he worked as a Groundsman for Lord and Lady Digby which instilled his love of Gardenina.

He met his wife Rose at a Village Fete. They married 2 years later. Between them they raised 7 children. After living and working on farms they later moved to Bovington where he was employed by the Forestry Commision. They planted thousands of trees, to create Moreton and Wareham Forest. He worked for them for over 30 years. It was a job he was really proud of and received a Long Service Medal. For his efforts.

After he was widowed he moved to Bere Regis and soon settled into the community. Being a religious man, he attended the local Churches including Bere Heath Chapel. He chose the Prayers and Hymns for his Funeral Service.

Dad was extremely proud of his grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He was known as a jolly person and liked to share a joke with anyone. Which is why whenever he went out for a meal, he would always ask for the 'back leg of a chicken' which confused a few waiters!

He once did a sponsored bike ride of 10 miles to raise funds for Leukemia Research. It was in memory of his niece Jennifer who died of the illness aged 16yrs. The riders raised £5000 pounds. Dad received a medal for being the oldest rider and having the highest amount of single sponsorship.

Dad was proud of his Scottish roots. His granny Mary Anderson became the first woman Governess/Teacher to teach at an all boys school in Aberdeen. Quite a feat in the early 1900s.

We were once told about his ancestor Thomas Whitty who established the

Axminster Carpet business back in 1755. Sadly a fire

destroyed the factory some years later.

Dad enjoyed living at Turberville Court and attended as many social gatherings there as he could especially the Autumn Leaves and the Golden Circle Club.

When his health started to fail him he moved to Anglebury Court in Wareham where he died in his sleep on the 4th of June.



BERE REGIS WILDLIFE GROUP

As I mentioned in last month's parish magazine, we are delighted that we have been awarded a grant of £650 from Wessex Water's Grid Watermark scheme to help enhance the wildlife in the Bere Stream. It is recognised by Wessex Water, the Dorset Wildlife Trust and others that

our stream is particularly rich in aquatic wildlife such as the White-clawed crayfish, because of the water purity. It is most important that there are a variety of habitats are retained within the stream.



After a couple of talks recently from Dorset Wildlife Trust on their work on Dorset Wild Rivers project on how to manage our 500m stretch of stream we wish to work with them to enhance the stream for wildlife. This work will be carried out in close association with our Parish Council and the plan is to help the stream meander by creating berms from some of the willow that grows alongside the river and address areas of erosion due to the surface water drain outlets. These berms will help trap silt and create habitat for the White-clawed crayfish. Also tree trunks will be installed into the river banks to push water around and help scour the river bed which will help the river create pools and riffles, and it is these riffles that the brown trout spawn on.

This work will be carried out in September and we are asking volunteers to come along and help. Dorset Wildlife Trust has recently submitted the formal consent to the Environment Agency and this will take 6 weeks for consideration, so once this is complete there will be work parties. Details of times for the work parties will be announced in the September magazine. So please, if you can, come and join us and help manage our stream which is admired by many and is a very special part of our village environment.

Before then, on 15th August we are holding another 'bioblitz' to find out more about the wildlife on Souls Moor Nature Reserve. Come and help the experts and learn about the great variety of wildlife that there is there. It will also be great fun for the younger generation!

Crime does not pay

You may be interested to know that 7 out of every 10 crimes committed are acquisitive crime, those are crimes where the perpetrator has gained financially from their wrong doing.

In 2002 the Government introduced the Proceeds of Crime Act, a law allowing enforcement agencies including Trading Standards the ability to identify, freeze, and through the courts apply for confiscation of criminal property gained from crime. Criminal property includes both savings and assets, such as houses and other lifestyle goods. The philosophy behind this is that when criminal finance is removed then further funding of criminal enterprises will stop.

In 2012 /2013 in excess of £12 million was recovered from convicted criminals by Trading Standards nationally using this process. The types of crime that Trading Standards Services have been using this legislation for include:

- Food fraud
- Supplying unsafe goods
- Selling counterfeit goods such as clothing and electrical products
- Rogue trading often targeting the vulnerable
- Car traders who misdescribe cars
- Scams whether by post, phone or the internet
- Illegal livestock slaughterhouses

Any money confiscated through the courts is redistributed by the Home Office and a percentage is given back to the Local Authority to be used specifically on local crime prevention initiatives.

If you suspect you have been a victim of crime by someone selling you goods or services then why not let us know about it. Call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 03454 04 05 06 where all calls are treated confidentially. Working with Citizens Advice we may be able to help you resolve the problem, seek to obtain money back and prevent the same happening to someone else.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

OLIVE AND WALNUT BREAD

INGREDIENTS

- 125g pitted black olives, roughly chopped
- 75g walnuts, finely chopped
- 600g white strong bread flour
- 2tsp salt
- 7gm sachet of fast acting yeast
- 5 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
- 3 tablespoons olive oil



METHOD

Mix the olives and walnuts together with the flour, salt, yeast and parsley.

Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and add 375ml/12fl oz of tepid water, mixed with the olive oil. Stir together to form a soft dough, adding a little more water if necessary.


Turn the dough into a well floured surface and knead well for about 10mins or until it is smooth and elastic.

Divide the dough in half and shape each piece into a roll 18-20cm/7-8 inches long. Place rolls of dough on separate oiled baking sheets and cover loosely with lightly oiled clingfilm.

Leave the dough in a warm place for 30-40mins or until doubled in size, lightly slash the top of each loaf.

Bake at 220C/425F/gas mark 7, for 12 minutes, lower the temperature to 180C/350F/gas mark 4 for a further 25 minutes or until well browned and sounding hollow when tapped on the bottom.

A lovely fresh bread to go with those summer salads or picnics.



THE CONGREGATIONAL CHAPEL

Destination: Heaven!

With the school holidays getting into full swing this month many families will be taking a well deserved break either in this country or abroad. For those flying abroad the planning may have already taken place and various factors considered. For instance – what airline should we fly with? Yes, there are many cheap (and not so cheerful) air services, but do they provide a good in-flight service with meals included; is the leg room adequate? After all we want a certain degree of comfort. And what about



baggage allowance? Will my hand luggage fit into those ridiculously small measuring containers? Am I going to be charged for each case placed in the luggage hold and is the allowance 15, 23 or even 40 kilogram's? Quite a lot to think about!

I feel for people nervous of flying. Why do they label the various parts of the airport with such intimidating names? As you arrive you have to make your way to a building marked TERMINAL! Having got there and checked your bags in you are directed to THE DEPARTURE LOUNGE. Of course all the security checks, necessary as they are in this day and age, can also be quite a hassle. And then you have to hang on to your boarding pass and your passport. All these frustrating hold-ups and checks are generally worth while as we sit back and fly to some sunny destination.

In a recent sermon, part of a series of sermons entitled – "Destination: Heaven" I used many of the above as an analogy of the Christian's life-long journey leading to heaven. What airline should we fly with? What route should we take? The Scriptures remind us that not all routes or religions lead to heaven. Jesus said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life – no one comes to the Father but by Me". Only through the completed work of Christ on the Cross was the full damage caused by sin dealt with. Only through Jesus and His righteousness can we enter God's heaven. The Bible describes Him as the Captain of our salvation (Hebrews 2:10).

Everyone has their own view of what heaven is like and how you get there. Many just think it's just "pie in the sky when you die" - an illusion; even worse - a

delusion. A blind and desperate belief that says there has to be something better than this sad old world we live in. The atheist might well suggest that we make our own heaven or hell down here on earth by the way we live. And death? Well that's just a state of oblivion – an endless nothingness. The Bible and God would beg to differ from such a fatalistic view. Jesus came to earth and His central message was about repenting and entering 'the Kingdom of heaven'. He made it clear, to both His Jewish and Gentile listeners, that just trying to be a good and helpful person in itself will not open the door to heaven for you and me. The plain fact is that none of us meet God's standards of perfection. And on that basis we are all excluded from God's heaven. But God so loved the world that there was One good enough – Jesus, the Pure and Perfect Man. And on the cross He died in our place as a Substitute.

As a Christian I know that this world is not my home – I'm just passing through. It's just a 'stop-over' for me on life's long haul flight. Through accepting what Jesus has done for me my citizenship is in heaven and I look forward to that day when I shall see my Saviour face to face. I can say that on the full authority of God's Word. This is what we read in Philippians 3:20 – "But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Saviour from there, the Lord Jesus Christ, who, by the power that enables Him to bring everything under His control, will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like His glorious body.

Purbeck District Council and Dorset County Council have worked together to refurbish 21 Cologne in Bovington to completely refit the run down building into some accommodation and a small community centre. This will be officially opened on Thursday August 20th and will be available for hire thereafter.



Mobile Libraries

Rural communities and those with no library service, as well as current users, are being encouraged to take part in Dorset County Council's mobile library service consultation, 13 July to 4 September. Since 2008/09, use of the county council's mobile libraries has declined by over 35 per cent – with less than four people using the service in some areas and on average less than ten items issued per visit. A number of stops have over time become significantly under-used, and the service

costs much more per customer compared to our static libraries. The county council provides a mobile library service to rural and outlying areas of the county, visiting over 250 locations by four mobile libraries. However some of these may be withdrawn if there is insufficient usage.






