



THOUGHTS DURING LAND THE INTERREGNUM - BOB NAYLOR

The queue for the check-in desk was long, and the crowd was pressing. The man towards the end of the queue was furious; "I want to be seated now! I can't wait in this line. I've got first class tickets" he screamed.

He went on and on as the attendant supervising the check-in procedure was patiently trying to explain the problem to him, but he'd have none of it. Finally he shouted, "Do you know who I am?" Immediately the sharp-witted attendant picked up the microphone and announced, "Attention please, we have a gentleman here who doesn't know who he is. If anyone can identify this man, please come immediately to the front check-in desk!!"

We laugh, or at least I hope you might, and we take some pleasure in his comeuppance, but it seems to me that here is a man who has all his identity wrapped up in what he does, what people say about him, and what he possesses. And when these are threatened he cries out, for what is left when this



material identity is challenged or gone? And he isn't on his own here. His story rings bells for many of us if we are really honest. But what **is** left, if he, if we but knew it, is that he and we are beloved sons and daughters of God.

This is our core identity and the one unchangeable reality in our lives.

I was talking to a lady after church on one Pentecost Sunday and she said to me that as she was growing up, it was years and years before she really believed that anyone could love her. And this was how she came to faith, for she realised, very movingly and very powerfully, that God loved her. Our conversation had started because in my sermon, in an attempt to shed some light on the significance of the feast of Pentecost, I had used a memory from my own childhood which has never, ever left me.

When I was 6 or 7 years of age, my parish church was an attractive semi-Gothic building with pillars that formed arches inside the body of the building and the nave. In the highest part of the arch in the sanctuary was a very large triangle, with




rays of light emanating from it. Inside this triangle was an enormous eye. As a boy of 6 or 7, I can remember being always intimidated by that large eye, high above the altar and always seemingly looking at me. Until one day, my Sunday School teacher caught me gaping apprehensively at the eye and said, "Bob, some people will tell you that this eye means that God is always watching you to see if you are doing anything wrong so he can punish you. I don't want you ever to think of it in this way. Every time you see that eye, I want you to remember that God loves you so much that he can't take his eyes off you" And so I did just that—in fact sometimes I'd give God a sneaky wave and say "HI God, it's me. Bob!" That God loved me in that way, really made a huge impression on me at that age.

It seems to me that we spend an awful lot of time and put an awful lot of effort and energy into maintaining our belief that "I am what I do"; "I am what others say and think about me"; "I am what I have". But really, that's not who you are and it's not who I am.

At his baptism, Jesus was told by God, "You are the beloved child. You are my beloved Son. On you my favour rests." This truth was the basic identity Jesus clung to as he lived his life with its ups and downs. People praised him and people

rejected him. People said "Hosanna" and people said "Crucify him" It made no difference as Jesus held on to the core truth. "Whatever happens, I am the beloved of God, and that is who I am, and will always be. That truth allows me to live in a world that keeps rejecting me, or praising me, or laughing at me, or spitting on me. I am the beloved. Not because people say I'm great, but because my Heavenly Father says so. He has forever called me beloved."

And what God says of Jesus, he also says of us. We are the beloved son or daughter of God, and he loves us so much that he can't take his eyes off us. And it seems to me that we must hear this truth, not only in our head but in our gut, and if we do this, lives can be turned around. Every time we are tempted to lash out, to despair, to become bitter or jealous, every time we feel rejected, or laughed at, or made fun of, or passed over, we should remember with absolute certainty — No matter what happens to me, good or bad, I am the beloved son or the beloved daughter of God."

BERE REGIS CHURCH NEWS

"NOT JUST FOR SUNDAYS"

...... is a new sacred work written by Dorset based composer Graham Stansfield in the unaccustomed free time his recent retirement from the post of Music Programmer at Poole's Lighthouse Arts Centre has allowed him.

The 75 minute work was inspired by reading Sir Roy Strong's excellent book on the history and current state of the 10,000 or so lovely village Churches in the UK. Sir Roy worries about their ever decreasing daily use by villagers, and strongly urges seven day a week community use.

The story the work tells is of David, a young Council architect, and Lucinda his fiancée, a local librarian, who are looking for somewhere special to get married. They have decided that getting married in a hotel, or worse, their own Council chamber just doesn't do it for them. So a Church wedding it has to be, and not having been to church goers since being very young Sunday school attendees, they visit their local parish church one Friday evening after work to see what it's like inside.

They are immediately bowled over by the atmosphere of peace and calm in the church, and as they admire the ancient features, to their surprise the choir comes in for their weekly Choir Practice, closely followed by the Vicar who is waiting to discuss things with the choir mistress.

The vicar approaches them and welcomes them, and as they talk he slowly reveals at their insistence the whole long history of the building and its use by the local community....with the choir in the background rehearsing music which by pure theatrical convenience (!) expresses the mood and spirit of each historical era that the vicar describes.

The work culminates with a great exhortation from the vicar, the choir, and the newly enthusiastic engaged couple for all villagers to come and rediscover the church and use it for all sorts of suitable community activities seven days a week.

JUNIOR CHURCH

It was puppets galore in church on Sunday the 10th of May. There were 4 down one side, 4 down the other side and 6 at the front of the church. They were all singing "Hey People. Do you love your Lord?" The song got everybody's feet tapping. The main reason for using so many puppets was that the largest group of children, within the Junior Church, is in the 7-10 year range. (The Junior Church currently involves 33 children with 6 preschool, 8 in early primary, 12 in later primary and 7 teenagers). So that when you add these 7-10 year olds puppeteers to our more experienced teengaer puppeteers, we are blessed with 16-19 puppeteers.

It can be quite challenging making sure that they are all included. Yet, with the new frames, we can now squeeze in 20 puppeteers in the "big band" puppet song at the end of the service. Even so it is the more experienced teenagers who take the lead in these songs and the younger puppeteers would like to show off their skills. So later this summer the Junior Church will be holding a special

"puppet service", out of church, on a day other than Sunday, with many puppet songs performed by this younger group and a few well known hymns. Do consider coming and joining us. The date and time will be announced, when we have practiced a little more. It should be a lively affair and a good place to try us out. If you have a grandchild or child that you think might like to get involved it would be a good time to demonstrate what the puppets can do. Or do not even wait for our puppet service. Come along next month and join us at our Pet Service on June the 14th.

Besides the four puppet practices (two for each age group) we are quite busy between the monthly services. Thanks to the help of two grandmothers we are about to start a "Grandma's knitting club" and this has generated a lot of interest. Also our younger members join the Methodists in a craft morning, once a month, called Buggies and Brunch. (All welcome, see sign inside the church porch or at Bere Heath Chapel). Then every other month the Junior Church bakes for the service. We made bread for Plough Sunday in January, decorated fairy cakes for the March Service and made jam tarts out of animal shaped puff pastry in May (to remind everybody about Pet Sunday). The children loved getting sticky and messy and the congregation loved eating the results with their teg and coffee at the end of the service. See photo of the children making pastry. NEPAL EARTHQUAKE DISASTER

We have all seen the pictures of collapsed buildings, destroyed villages and injured people being dua out from beneath piles of rubble caused by the seauence of major earthquakes in Nepal. The risk of a major earthauake had been foreseen. and contingency plans had been prepared, but the current disaster exceeds



all expectations. The country of Nepal is amongst the poorest in the world, and cannot handle a disaster of this proportion without help.

In response to the disaster we have invited members of the community to donate money, with the specific objective of supporting first response medical teams treating injured people in remote hill areas, and the ongoing medical treatment of these victims. This is organised through the organisation that we worked with during our time in Nepal. The United Mission to Nepal has established hospital and other medical operations in Nepal, and these facilities have provided medical teams who were amongst the first to reach many of the more remote areas that had suffered. They are also co-ordinating the work of emergency medical teams that have come from outside Nepal.

The response to the appeal for funds has been very generous, so far over £3,400 has been donated from our community. On behalf of the people of Nepal we give heartfelt thanks to the many individual donors, with special thanks to the Briantspuddle Singers, who donated £472, and to those who attend Briantspuddle Community Group events, who donated £206. Most of this money has already been delivered to the United Mission to Nepal in Kathmandu, and they report that almost 75% of the costs of the medical teams have been covered.

We will keep the fund open for a little longer, if anyone would like to contribute, especially towards the continuing cost of medical treatment for earthquake victims, then we would be pleased to receive your donations.

Wind Turbines

Residents expressed deep concern regarding a revised application for five turbines to be located near Tolpuddle.

With many issues raised concerning potential negative impact upon the parish and residential amenity the PC unanimously opposed the application. The application is vet to be brought before the West Dorset District Council Planning Committee and the PC will be represented at the planning meeting when this is determined.

The Debenham Paintings

Following public subscription, all the paintings have now been restored and hung in the main hall. We would like to thank everyone who contributed finance, expertise and management, particularly John Solly for leading the group.

Defibrillator

Thanks to the efforts of Sarah Lowman and David Griffith the community now has access to a Defibrillator. We had a very useful training session in the village hall where we were shown how simple it is to use and perform resuscitation.

Volunteer of the Year

This year the Volunteer of the Year was awarded to the Bladen Estate Centenary Exhibition Group. It was in recognition of the efforts made by anyone who volunteered in any way. The exhibition itself has to be the highlight of the year and the professional approach was inspiring. On behalf of the community, I would like to take this opportunity to thank them all once again.

Volunteers

I would like to pay a particular thank you to Linda Holmes who has now stepped down after many years of running the oil co-operative. She has saved our residents a considerable sum of money on their heating bills and has ensured this can continue by putting in place an alternative.

Volunteers are the lifeblood of our community. They selflessly contribute time and resources to the many organisations and events that take place in our community. I would like to thank every volunteer for their continued commitment; the parish would be a much poorer place without it.

June 2015

Consultations

We have responded to many consultations this year including the Dorset County Council Ward Boundary Review and the Partial Review of the Purbeck Local Plan. We are still awaiting the results of both of these.

We are preparing for further consultations for the Dorset Waste and Mineral site allocation plan with a presentation to the council booked for later in the year. There are four sites that have been put forward for inclusion with particular interest to the parish, Moreton Plantation, Woodsford (adjoining Pallington), Hurst Farm and station Road, Moreton.

The council has already made a significant contribution in opposing the Moreton Plantation site and will be taking great interest in the other three due to potential impact on the parish.

Parish Maintenance

The lengthsman and the grass cutting contractor continue to maintain publicly owned assets and areas including around the War Memorial, village hall, notice boards and bus shelter. It is expected to resume our refurbishment of the finger posts later in the year.

It has been noted that there is an increase in the level of dog fouling in the parish. The council considered a number of ways in which this could be countered but were generally not in favour of bins or a plethora of signs in the countryside. It was considered that a policy of education would take place in the first instance with articles in both the Parish Magazine and website.

Precept and Reserves

The council increased the precept this year by 8%, a total of £609 over every household. In reviewing the budget for 2015/16 councillors needed to consider the potential requirement for professional advice and representation for the gravel extraction review and the removal of subsidy for the lengthsman. There has also been a considerable increase in the insurance for the Granary and potentially higher grant funding for the VHC to contribute to their insurance premium.

Looking ahead, we need to reserve funds for legal costs to renew PC leases for the VHC and Bladen Social Club.

We also need to ring fence around £3500 in the event of a standalone election and to keep an emergency fund available for building repairs.

Superfast Broadband

This is now available in Affpuddle and imminently in Briantspuddle. We would like

It will be our usual lively service with puppets drama and dance, as well as traditional hymns and prayers.

Poaching is somewhat rife at present with much activity around Affpuddle and surrounding forestry.

Road Traffic Accidents are low but we would welcome the reporting of any incidents within the parish to bolster statistics to help with highway safety management, especially Waddock Cross.

Heating oil theft within the SNT area is also increasing.

One particular theft was the post box at Waddock. In our bid to have it replaced the council reached the end of the Royal Mail's complaints procedure without success. We can ask them to review the decision in 6 months, which we will do.

Planning Applications

There has been a steady flow of applications this year and the training that councillors regularly undertake has been most helpful in the deliberations. On a point of procedure, the council asked PDC to review its referral to committee process when the District Councillors time limit fell short of that of the PC when the latter was given an extension. The result remains unsatisfactory but overall it is important that the PC continues to be able to request an extension where the time limit does not coincide with our meeting schedule.

Highways

The meeting with the DCC Highways Head of Traffic Management last year and our County Councillor has resulted in the conclusion of one of our long term aims. The 30 mph limit to the south of Affpuddle has been approved and the new signage will be in place within days.

We have yet to receive a response to our requests for similar extensions south on Shop Hill and east taking in Throop.

Waddock Cross has always been regarded by both the council and residents as a very dangerous junction yet our requests for improvements are met with the response that it complies with traffic regulations. We are resolved to continue our efforts to facilitate improvements.

Flooding

Major improvements have been made to many areas including Shop Hill, east of the village hall and Throop corner. It is expected that work envisaged to unblock a drain at the Briantspuddle Crossroads will be undertaken imminently. I would like to thank Jim Sargant, the tenant of land at Throop, for his co-operation in the removal of Leylandii which were impacting on power lines and drains.

The Council

The elections in May 2014 left the PC with only 6 elected councillors. The three vacancies were quickly filled by the co-option of Jonathon Haigh, Sally King and Mike Menzies. We have recently received the resignation of Sally King and Graham Lightfoot but hope to bring the council back to full strength shortly. Sally and Graham have given sterling service to the council over many years and I would like to thank them for their commitment to the community through their work on the council.

Parish Amenity Review

The council has maintained a continuous dialogue with all the amenities and the review has progressed through the Chairs Meetings.

An initial success is the completion and implementation of a new lease agreement for the Briantspuddle Post Office and Village Shop Association. This is now a long term agreement giving greater security of tenure, a small increase in rent and a transfer of the responsibility for maintenance of the entire building to the Association. The latter will allow the procurement of external grant funding to save community funds. The council is prohibited from accessing grants but will provide funding if needed.

The Village hall lease needs to be separated from the Lease and Trust Deed which will be a priority in the coming year along with a review of the Heads of Agreement which governs the lease of the club premises and relationship between club, hall and council.

Amenity Building Valuations

In light of reports in national media of instances where insurance companies refused to make any payments against claims for an under insured Listed Building and a subsequent requirement from the relevant planning authority for reinstatement, the council procured a professional valuation of all buildings on the village hall site. The Granary and hall were found to be substantially under insured and as such this has now been rectified.

Police and Crime

Thankfully we live in a very peaceful area and crime is generally low. The main issues for the Safer Neighbourhood Team in our area are the continued use of 4x4's and motorbikes in Sares Wood where the Police have had some success in apprehending offenders, although continued vigilance is needed.

Fraud, in the form of telephone, internet scams and cold door callers requires everyone to be mindful and to keep awareness high within the community.

Fibre Optic Broadband Update

Fibre has arrived in Briantspuddle and soon all the service providers will be aware and pushing people to connect. So far 3 connections have been arranged and are seeing well above the promised 24 Mbps. As more people upgrade the speed may fall a bit but it might also relieve the pressure on the existing copper wire service. It will be well worth working out what you really want from broadband versus the cost of changing. Remember that the reliability of the fibre service – which should be better overall - is still subject to the line from the roadside cabinet to your computer which remains as copper wire buried underground and hung between poles. It is still also subject to the quality of your own installation.

Reconstruction of New Culvert at Cecily's Pool and Saddling of Cecily's Bridge, Cecily's Bridge Road, Near Bere Regis.

The Parish Council have been advised that work will commence on the above from 8th June 2015 with the aim to complete on 21st August 2015. During this time a section of the bridge will be closed. Appropriate signage warning motorists about the road closure will be erected.

Bill ran the home Watch in Briantspuddle for many years and along with his wife Philippa made a significant contribution to the community with the gift of land to accommodate the village hall extension and a financial donation.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Philippa Thorniley for her dedication to the service of this community and for the legacy she has left as she prepares for her imminent move to Poundbury.

Parochial Church Council

Stephen Sanderson reported that a new vicar had been appointed to the Parishes of Affpuddle & Turnerpuddle and Bere Regis. Rev. Cannon Masheder and his wife, Felicity, will be arriving in the Autumn. During the interregnum Rev. Bob Naylor has been helping with services and his efforts have been considerable and greatly appreciated.

The building has been reviewed and it was reported to be in good condition considering its age but 2014-2015 saw repairs to the window costing around £4,000. The church yard has continued to be maintained by volunteers and has been well kept during the year.

Over the next two years the Church aims to seek permission for a toilet facility, the project will be complex due to the nature of the building and its Listed status.

Bladen Social Club

Sue Jeanes spoke about the continued fundraising events that the Social Club has organised during the year. As a result they have been able to donate to a number of charitable causes.

The club continues to host darts and skittles and the regular annual events continue for example the Horticultural Show and the Village Quiz.

Efforts are being made to attract new members and the "pie and pint nite" is proving very popular.

Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Statutory Meeting 13th May 2015

The Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Statutory Meeting took place in May. At the Statutory Meeting the Chair and Vice Chair were elected for the coming year. Nick Gore was elected Chair and Sue Jones as Vice Chair.

Village Shop and Post Office

BRIANTSPUDDLE COMMUNITY GROUP

Just a little update, mainly to give our recently used recipe for Rhubarb Fool which was served to general approbation at the April Lets Lunch.

Since we live in a rural parish some of us will have a patch of rhubarb, or have a kindly friend or neighbour who grows it, and if you grow rhubarb there's usually a bit of a surplus at this time of year. Hopefully you can lay your hands on enough to make this posh pud.

Rhubarb Fool

Ingredients:

- 2lb rhubarb cleaned and cut into chunks
- Granulated sugar (to taste)
- 4 fluid ounces water
- 10 fluid ounces double cream
- 5 fluid ounces thick cold custard (can be home made or from a carton)
- Brandy Snaps or ginger biscuits to serve.

Method

Place the water in a saucepan on a low heat on top of stove. When simmering add rhubarb chunks and stew gently for as long as it takes to soften the rhubarb but try not to create a mush. Sweeten to taste, not too much sugar as the finished fool benefits from a little tartness. Allow to cool completely.

Reserve a small amount of the stewed fruit and put in bottom of individual serving dishes (looks good served in wine glasses) save a few chunks also if you can, then mix the remainder with the custard in a large bowl. Whip up the cream to soft peaks and gently fold into custard mixture. Fill each serving dish with the mixture and chill.

To serve place a few chunks on top of each dish and garnish with your chosen biscuit. Yummy.

Numbers for Lets Lunch now hover around the mid 30's each month, (more than we had expected) and our next offering is to be chicken and ham pie followed by trifle.

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OBITUARIES

MAURICE TUCKER

Maurice Tucker was born on 10th June 1929 the eldest of six children at Bardolf Manor in Puddletown. In the early 1930s the family moved to Shroton north of Blandford and then lived for a short time in Iwerne Minster before returning to Druce near Puddletown. This was where Maurice was to do the majority of his schooling. He left school in 1944 and worked for a time as a Hall Boy at Waterstone Manor and then in the gardens on the Ilsington Estate.

In the early 1950s Maurice moved to live at Number 3 Affpuddle thus beginning a close association with the village that was to last for the rest of his life. Shortly after this move Maurice began work at the Piddlehinton Bakery to which he cycled the twelve mile round trip each and every day after a very early morning start! He was always a hard worker. After work at the bakery Maurice became a delivery driver for Wrights fruit and veg store in St Georges Road Dorchester and embarked upon a love affair with the motor vehicle and things mechanical that was to last for the rest of his life.

In 1947 Maurice was called up for national service and was posted to the Middle East where he spent the majority of his time serving with the Dorset Regiment in the Suez Canal Zone, working in their vehicle maintenance section. In 1949, having completed his two years National Service, Maurice returned to Affpuddle and worked as a delivery driver for Hayden's bread shop in Puddletown and on 24th of June of 1950, at the age of 21, he married Audrey Mitchell, a marriage that was to last for 55 years.

In 1952 Maurice and Audrey moved to the family home at Number 7 Affpuddle, and it was in Affpuddle that they were to live very happily for the rest of their lives and raising four children together: Caroline, Michael, Geraldine and finally Peter. All the children except Caroline were born in the family home at Number 7.

Maurice was naturally gifted with his hands and was fascinated by anything mechanical and in particular by motor vehicles. It was therefore not surprising

that he became a talented mechanic. Maurice soon gained a job working for the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (REME) at Bovington Camp where he was closely involved in maintaining and testing military vehicles all over the country. This frequently meant periods working away from home at bases up and down the country. Unfortunately a serious motor cycle accident at Winterborne Kingston brought an end to Maurice's career with the REME.

Increase the volunteer base

Operate more village lunches and breakfast/cream tea events to satisfy the Dorset POPP grant.

Provide better extraction, sinkage and hot water availability within the kitchen.

Agree shared use of the Bladen Social Club Bar facility or consider the construction of our own dedicated facility to encourage greater commercial hire.

Aim to cover the basic operating costs of the Village Hall and raise an additional £5000 to go towards a contingency fund for building maintenance and equipment repair/replacement.

Strive to eliminate the need for a grant from the Parish Council if we can, thereby leaving those funds intact for other good works in the Parish.

Investigate and modernise the Lease and Trust Deeds using the best structure that fits the Village Hall Committee's needs going forward.

Also at the Annual General Meeting and thereafter at the first Trustees Meeting of the New Year, the following Trustees were nominated and elected.

After a number of other jobs at Winfrith and Bovington, Maurice's love for engineering took him to Creekmoor near Poole where he trained as a precision engineer. He then worked as a mechanic for a model boat business in Bere Regis which took him to many theme parks around the country including Thorpe Park near London and Paulton's Park in the New Forest. In the course of this work Maurice created many different objects from fibreglass and much of his work can be still seen in the Parks to this day. Early in 2000 an opportunity arose for Maurice to move back nearer to home to work in Bovington Camp as a maintenance engineer at the Tank Museum where he worked happily until he retired aged 71 in order to care for Audrey as her health deteriorated.

Maurice was a man of wide interests, playing darts in the local pubs league in his youth and frequenting dances in the local village halls. He particularly enjoyed going to listen and dance at Country and Western evenings. However, after his family, Maurice's greatest love was for things mechanical and he was at his happiest in a pair of overalls, head under the bonnet of a motor vehicle, or simply rummaging around in his garage. On many an evening Maurice was to be seen repairing a car in his garage and if Audrey was out at bingo he would often have an engine on the kitchen table so that he could grind out the valves! Maurice very generous and thoughtful man, gifted man with his hands and always ready to use his talents to help others. Nothing would beat him if it needed repair or alteration. Nearly every house in Affpuddle has at some time or another had a mower, car, bicycle or building work carried out by Maurice Tucker.

Although a mechanic by training Maurice always remained a countryman at heart and spent many enjoyable hours walking in the woods and meadows around Affpuddle. He enjoyed all nature programmes on the television, especially those of David Attenborough and he very rarely missed an episode of Countryfile on a Sunday evening. Maurice loved reading and watching birds and owls were a particular favourite. Always a practical man, this interest led him to make a Barn Owl Box which still sits in an old Ash Tree on the banks

the River Piddle in Affpuddle. It was here that in the last years of his life Maurice would spend many a happy hour in the late evening sitting on a bench, which he also made, watching the Barn Owls as they hunted across the water meadows in the gathering dusk.

Maurice Tucker was a loving and hard-working son, husband, father, brother, grandfather and great grandfather. He will be sadly missed by his family and also by his many friends.



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approximately £500 a year to our annual insurance costs.

The effect of this, plus the other one-off revenue items in 2014 will leave us short of our revenue target by around £1900 in the coming year, which is a considerable sum to find.

During the year we facilitated the Bladen Estate Centenary Exhibition and the restoration of the Bladen Paintings, providing the facility, insurance for events and accounting. The works were carried out by volunteers and we commend them to the community.

On Corporate Governance we have introduced a much needed Conflict of Interest Policy and embarked on researching our options to modernise our Trust constitution, possibly by taking it into "incorporated" status.

Our Business Plan, written pre-development, relies heavily on the use of the facilities by external commercial organisations. We have come to the realisation that such use requires a better equipped kitchen and access to proper bar facilities. A well-stocked and enticing bar facility is a worthy aspiration and whilst our kitchen is good, it lacks sufficient sinkage, a decent hot water supply, effective fume extraction, a large microwave and decent portable catering quality kitchen equipment.

We have now been awarded a Dorset POPP grant for the purchase and provision of additional catering quality kitchen equipment, including a decent Microwave Oven, this will help to make our kitchen more acceptable for commercial use and we intend that we can also make some improvements to hot water provision, sinkage and cooking fume extraction during the next year, there is also money in the account for this.

We have made initial contact with the Bladen Social Club to open discussion regarding greater use of their bar facilities but in realty we have not yet started a meaningful dialogue. It will be our intention to explore this more fully during the coming months to see if a shared arrangement can be found, if this does not come to fruition, we may need to consider the installation of our own dedicated facility.

We have applied for grant financing for building works to repair the frost damaged cob on the eastern elevation of the main hall. It is planned that this work will take place around September of 2015, allowing time for the Swifts to nest and vacate and for the colony of Hairy Footed Masonry Bees to be encouraged to lay their grubs towards the top of the wall so that we can render the bottom section and install "Bee Blocks" for them to have a permanent home without further Cob damage. We will also replace the two green oak posts that support the front porch as they are full of Death watch Beetle.

The Dorset POPP grant does come with a price tag. In order to gain the grant, we need to put on more village events that will use the catering equipment. We are

As you will have read in the previous edition of the Parish Magazine, the Annual General Meeting of the Briantspuddle Village Hall Committee took place on Wednesday 6th May. Surely the most important election of that week...! The following report is an abridged version of the report given by the Chairman of the Briantspuddle Village Hall Committee at the Annual General Meeting held on 6th May 2015, updated to include the decisions made at the subsequent meeting of the new Committee.

Charity Number 288210 Abridged Chairman's Report for 2014

It has been a busy year with many changes. We have seen a number of our Trustees leave us and a former one re-join us, a change of Chairman and the emergence of a new Community Group for which we now have a Representative Trustee.

Financially we have enjoyed good revenue due to a number of one off events such as the Bladen Estate Exhibition, The Arts Exhibition, Sales of the Bladen China and Tea Towels and reclaim of previously unclaimed gift aid on donations received.

We have cleared the remaining £5000 of Architects and Builders Fees outstanding which were associated with the development and we have added a further £5000 to our reserves for building maintenance and repair. Our only outstanding debt is now the repayment of the redeemable bonds issued to raise the shortfall in cash needed to complete the refurbishment of the Village Hall. The good news is that this sum is sitting in our bank account ready to be drawn.

Unfortunately, towards the end of the year following a review by this Parish Council, we found that our buildings insurance was deficient and so we found it necessary to increase our sum assured from £730,000 to £1,150,000, this will add

"JUNE"

The sixth month of the year – June takes its name from the Roman god 'Junius' (or Junonius). In the northern hemisphere the summer solstice occurs during this month. The word 'solstice' is derived from the Latin, 'the sun stands still'. This appears to happen when the sun reaches its highest point of the year, 21st June, making it the longest day – the winter solstice being when it is at its lowest and the shortest day. The old Dutch name for June was Zomer-maand (summer-month) and the old Saxon, Sere-monath (dry-month), and Lida-arra (joy time). In the French Revolutionary Republican calendar the month was called Prairial (meadow-month) which actually corresponds to our 20th May to 18th June, and does not include the summer solstice! It is said that June marriages are lucky, hence the old saying "Good to the man and happy to the maid." This is an old Roman superstition. The festival of Juno was held in June, and Juno was the great guardian of women from birth to death. This year, Sunday 21st June 2015, is 'Father's Day" (a 20th century importation from the USA to compliment 'Mother's Day')!

The Festival of the Nativity of St John the Baptist is celebrated on 24th June (this year a Wednesday) which is officially Midsummer Day (often confused with the summer solstice). He is not only the patron saint of the church in Bere Regis but also that of bird-dealers, lambs, monks & tailors.

In 1826, at the age of only 17, Felix Mendelssohn composed a stunning concert overture for William Shakespeare's play "A Midsummer Night's Dream" – Overture in E major, Op.21. It was an immediate success and since lauded as one of the greatest romantic short compositions of the era. Some years later, in 1842, he composed the now well-known 'incidental music' to the play – his Op.61 – in which he incorporated his earlier overture. This work includes a piece that is played at many weddings throughout the year – the famous "Wedding March". It became fashionable at marriage services following the wedding of Victoria, the Princess Royal (daughter of Queen Victoria), to Prince Frederick William of Prussia, on 25th January 1858. Mendelssohn, of course, had become a close friend of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert, often performing his and others' works for them, on his many visits to the United Kingdom which he so much admired.





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celebrates an event and other a doctrine - but both are intertwined.

Much as I like the sentiments for world peace in John Lennon's song "Imagine" the lyrics present a utopian dream in which the perceived main reasons for bad things happening in the world are removed. One of the lines says, "Imagine there's no heaven, it's easy if you try" implying that this is one of the things that have to be removed to create a perfect world of harmony and love.

Jesus came to bring world peace – but a peace centred not on the external things but on the inner heart and mind of each individual person. And far from imagining that there was no heaven – He came and declared the kingdom of heaven and how, even as sinful and flawed men and women, we could be received there one day. But the obstacles that have to be overcome are not found outside but within every heart of every single human being. In Matthew 15:19 we have a catalogue of bad things that all start from within. Take time to have a look at what Jesus says. This inner sin is what prevents us from being received in God's heaven and that is why Jesus had to get inside our human skin – the 'Word became flesh and dwelt among us' so that he as the Perfect Man could die in our place and take the punishment of our sin and open the gate of heaven for us.

Sometimes Christians are accused of being delusional. It is suggested that when we long for something so much our mind will persuade us that it is available and obtainable. The advantage of the Christian is that they have the objective evidence of history to back up their beliefs. Jesus spoke on many occasions about the reality of heaven – in fact He said on one occasion, "I am going to prepare a place for you and if I go I will come back again and take you to be with Me." (John 14:2-4). And forty days after the resurrection in Acts 1: 9-11, Jesus ascended into heaven before the eleven disciples. The Ascension is important because it completed the work of Jesus on earth and reminds us that even now He is preparing a place for all those who put their trust in Him. It is because of the ascension that we don't have to imagine there's a heaven – it's already established; Jesus reigns there along with the other Persons of the Godhead and one day He will return to wind up history as we know it.

Which leads us on to The Trinity – certainly a mysterious and yet wondrous concept of a three-in-one God – God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. This description of God forms the benediction of many services including christenings. The Bible declares that Father, Son and Holy Spirit are co-equal and co-eternal. They are One Person. The roles of the Godhead are distinctively different – God the Father arranged our salvation; God the Son accomplished our salvation on the cross and through the resurrection; and God the Holy Spirit applies that salvation to us as we respond in repentance and faith.

When Christopher Columbus was on his third voyage to America, he saw what appeared to be three islands rising up out of the ocean. But as the ship came nearer he saw that what he had thought were three islands were really three


mountain peaks joined together at their bases by a low strip of land. There was only one island, not three. So he gave it the Spanish name for Trinity; He called it Trinidad because, he said, this is what the trinity means. While we are still afar off we can only see three persons – when we draw nearer and get to know God through what Jesus has done for us on the cross and receive the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives, then we see God as He is, and we find out that the three persons are actually One God.

We can know for sure that when we die we will go to heaven if we are made right with God Our Father and put our trust in Jesus, The Son of God, and receive that inner witness of God the Holy Spirit. Do you have this assurance? Every week in Chapel we come in praise and worship and through God's Word try to get to know God in a deeper way. Why not join us? Our Sunday Morning Services begin at 10.30am with facilities for Junior Church and a crèche if required.

"And now may the grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God Our Father, and the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit be with you now and forevermore. Amen"


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BERE REGIS BOOK GROUP

The Ocean at the end of the Lane by Neil Gaiman.

This book was voted book of the year in 2013 beating a host of noted authors writing in a variety of genres. Neil Gaiman stated that it began as a short story, but he couldn't stop writing. He went on to say that he had never written a book before that was so close to his heart – a story about memory and magic and fear and danger of being a child.



We see the narrator at middle age returning to the area of his youth for a funeral and being drawn back to the farmhouse near to his old family home, where the three seemingly ageless Hempstock women lived. Sitting at the edge of the duck pond - Lettie's 'ocean', he recalls the adventure they lived together when he was 7. Here, as a child he was befriended by the 11 year old Lettie, her mother and grandmother who are aware that all is not quite right in their world as some unexplained happenings were resulting in negative consequences for individuals. We are taken through a supernatural world with the pair as Lettie attempts to send the dark forces back from whence they came with the timeless powers of the Hempstock women. Unfortunately, her first attempt is unsuccessful as the forces attempt to take over our hero who finds that the evil is with him in his home. As he needs to escape the wicked nanny, who only he knows to be a




BERE REGIS WILDLIFE GROUP

June 20 is National Neighbourhood and Home Watch Week.

Dorset Trading Standards work with Citizens Advice to help people stay safe from scams. The website www.citizensadvice.org.uk has really good information to help protect yourself from scams including internet crime.

Topics include protecting your computer and wi-fi network, spotting phishing emails and websites where scammers try to obtain your personal and financial card details, top tips to protect your identity and cash from online scammers. The website also has a fun 'scam spotting quiz' to help you become more confident in spotting this type of fraud. Why not take a look now?

Scams do come in many different shapes and sizes though and we wanted to take this opportunity to remind you about Dorset Police's campaign to 'Hang up on Fraudsters' because telephone fraudsters are targeting Dorset residents.

The fraudsters pretend they are from the police, a bank, retailer or fraud department. They tell their victim that their account has been compromised and to dial 999 or their bank to confirm the call is genuine. BUT the fraudster keeps the phone line open so when the victim redials they are still talking to a fraudster who tricks them into handing over their bank details, Personal identification Number (PIN) or cash for safe keeping.

NEVER give out your pin number or bank details to ANYONE who calls you, no matter who they claim to be, or where they claim to be from

Never send cash in a taxi or via courier

Never send bank cards anywhere - always keep them with you

The police and your bank will NEVER ask you for your personal bank information over the phone.

ENID'S ASPARAGUS CRUMBLE

Ingredients

Adjust the amounts to cater for the amount of people you are catering for

WHITBREAD PAIRS TROPHY at KNIGHTON HEATH GOLF CLUB

Thirteen pairs of R.O.G.S. took to the heathland fairways of Knighton Heath to challenge for the Trophy.

The Course was founded in 1932 when land at the east end of Canford Heath was purchased from Lord Wimborne. The Course was originally named Northbourne Golf Club and was officially opened in 1934 with an exhibition match between Percy Alliss, proffessional at Ferndown Golf Club (father of the well known `voice of golf `Peter Alliss`) and Alf Pagham. Both were well known professionals at the peak of their game.

In 1959 it was renamed New Northbourne Golf Club when purchased by Mr Billy Knott. He sold it in 1972 but the new owner went bankrupt in 1976, after which the club was purchased by the members and renamed Knighton Heath Golf Club.

I wonder how many people have travelled along Ringwood Road at Wallisdown not knowing that just off the Mountbatten Roundabout lies the Golf Club, which to my knowledge is not visible from any of the major roads in the area.

We had a three way tie at the top with each pair scoring 43 points, (although not participating in the event, Sir G's guest Ray Twine and the Capt. Also scored 43 points). Having sorted out the countback congratulations go to Peter Cheeseman and Charlie Way in 1st place. I should mention here that Charlie has won this event four times in the last five seasons with a different partner each time, well done Sir Charles.



Theory of Everything (PG-13) shown by 'Milborne Movies' at Milborne St Andrew Village Hall (DT11 0JX)

The Theory of Everything is the story of Stephen Hawking (Eddie Redmayne), the most brilliant and celebrated physicist of our time, and Jane Wilde (Felicity Jones) the arts student he fell in love with. Stephen Hawking, was a bright but shiftless student of cosmology, who was once a healthy, active



young man, until he receives an earth-shattering diagnosis at 21 years of age and is given just two years to live. However, he becomes galvanized, by the love of fellow Cambridge student, Jane Wilde, going on to be called the successor to Einstein. With Jane fighting tirelessly by his side, Stephen embarks on his most ambitious scientific work, studying the very thing he now has precious little of time. Together, they defy impossible odds, breaking new ground in medicine and science, and achieving more than they could ever have dreamed. Stephen's rise to fame as an author, lecturer and scientist is depicted almost parallel to his worsening health issues.

Redmayne is an able performer who understands the subtle effects of the beginnings of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). This movie gives viewers a little insight into Stephen's scientific discoveries and even more about a brilliant, complex and determined man. Jones is terrific as Jane, who remains devoted even though helping her husband and raising the children exhausts her. Her performance is an accomplished blend of fierce determination to see her husband survive, and private frustration at the professional sacrifices that selflessness wrought. There is a gorgeous score composed by Jóhann Jóhannsson which adds a lovely charm to each scene, as does the cinematography of Benoit Delhomme. Unabashedly sweet and gentle, "The Theory of Everything" casts a warm glow on the personal life of physicist Stephen Hawking and is moving, astounding and, perhaps most of all, enlightening.

A feast of glorious music will be performed at **The Wessex Festival 2015**. The Festival runs from 13-16 August and comprises an eclectic mix of concerts and choral services in six Dorset churches, a Folk night in Wimborne and two Rambles near Kingston Lacy.

The opening concert, on Thursday, 13 August, will be in St Martin's Church, Bryanston. This beautiful church, with views of the river Stour and open countryside is the perfect setting for **English Serenade**. The concert, comprises Vaughan Williams' masterpiece **The Lark Ascending** – voted the most popular piece of classical music in the 2014 Classic FM's Hall of Fame. The soloist will be Christina Scott, Head of Strings at Bryanston School. There will be three choral items in the

concert, sung by the Festival's three choirs – Vaughan Williams' **Benedicite**, and two pieces by Festival Director, David Everett, **Requiem: Light Everlasting** and, receiving its world premiere, **Praise and Thanksgiving**. This concert is followed by Compline.

On the following night the Festival will be in Blandford's amazing Georgian Parish Church for a concert by The Brunel String Quartet. The quartet will perform an enticing programme of eclectic music by Haydn, Warlock, Karl Jenkins and Vaughan Williams. The highlight promises to be Finzi's **By Footpath and Stile** in which baritone Gareth Jones joins the quartet for a rare performance of this Thomas Hardy song cycle.

The final concert on Saturday, 15 August, will be in the fantastic surroundings of Wimborne Minster. This concert of beautiful music will include Vivaldi's **The Four Seasons** and two works by Handel, **Zadok the Priest** and the **Dettingen Te Deum**. The soloist in the Vivaldi will be Fiona McKinley, Head of Strings at Canford School.

Kingston Lacy Church will be the venue for two afternoon Young Artists Recitals, the churches in Wimborne St Giles and Child Okeford will host two Eucharists, and there will be a Festival Choral Evensong in Wimborne Minster on Sunday 16 August, followed by a relaxed evening in The White Hart pub, a minute or two from the Minster for an evening of Folk music performed by talented local musicians.

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
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SONGBIRDS BABY AND TODDLER MUSIC GROUP
