

Whilst Government restrictions have been eased, the Parish Council is currently hiring the main hall in the Village Hall for its monthly meetings. This much larger room allows us to accommodate more people at the meeting whilst still exercising some social distancing measures. This means we have an opportunity to add an Agenda item to our September meeting about the Jubilee, namely, to invite ideas from Parishioners about how they would like to celebrate or mark this unique occasion.

There is an opportunity for public participation at the start of each meeting from 7 pm and this session will be extended to 45 minutes to hear from Parishioners across the Parish. All are welcome.

On-Road Parking

Concerns have been expressed to the Parish Council that some on-road parking might obstruct emergency vehicles reaching their destination. It is of course recognised that some homes lack the necessary off-road parking to

Community Speed Watch

The Parish Council has received a very positive response to the suggestion of establishing a Community Speed Watch Group jointly with Puddletown Parish. This collaboration will mean that both costs and resources will be shared. Sufficient volunteers have now come forward to establish a group in Affpuddle.



Anyone interested in volunteering for a Community Speed Watch Group anywhere within the parish should contact the Parish Council Clerk. If there is enough interest the group could be expanded.

The Parish Council will continue to work with the Highways Authority to seek to improve road safety, particularly on the B3390 through Affpuddle. Data gathered by the Community Speedwatch Group may assist with this wider safety issue.

Affpuddle & Turnerspuddle Parish Council sets aside a sum of money each year which can be applied for by local organisations for projects that will be of benefit to residents with the Parish. For the year 2021/22 the total budget for grant funding is £500.

FROM THE DEAN:

"We shall not cease from exploration

And the end of all our exploring

Will be to arrive where we started

And know the place for the first time".

TS Eliot's words have particular resonance every September. Back to



school; back to work; back to church; back to the whole range of familiar routines, habits, and disciplines that the summer has disrupted. Since you last read *Grapevine* you may have taken a holiday, whether a Covid-induced staycation or an adventure further afield. Or you may have been made aware of others taking a holiday. Perhaps you have welcomed them into your home or your church (or perhaps you have found that your workload has increased as you have covered for colleagues). Whatever shape it's taken, the summer has meant exploration, whether of new places or of our own reserves of patience!

But the end of all our exploration is to arrive, and to arrive here. In September. Where we started. At the familiar juncture where schools return, congregations regroup, and office life resumes. Where normality reasserts itself.

Will it, though? Eliot's point is that when we arrive at it, the juncture is no longer familiar. We know it as though "...for the first time". That's because the exploration has changed us. Our expectations and assumptions are not what they were when we started out.

Working in the Cathedral, particularly in August, I am reminded of this pattern of change every single day. Our earnest hope is that when our visitors leave the Close they are not quite who they were when they arrived. Perhaps they will have watched one of the masons at work, and have been encouraged to think about the gifts they might want to develop; perhaps they will have learned that the building was raised by one generation, and have been inspired to consider what their own generation might achieve. Perhaps in a moment of deep stillness in the shade of the Trinity Chapel, or in a prayer offered by a duty chaplain, or in an Eastwards-looking vista of captivating beauty they will have turned their gaze to the God who longs for them.

If any of those is true then when they return home they will not be who they were when they set out. Nor are any of us as we head into this autumn. We may like to think of ourselves as human beings: in reality we are human becomings. September is here. The month when everything begins again. But we look at every new year with new eyes. We are on a journey. We start afresh. Thanks be to God!



I wonder if, like me, you enjoy looking up at the stars on a clear night? I'm always amazed at how many there are, and I would love to be able to look at them through a really strong telescope. I gather the sight is amazing. I recently came across the following information about some of the stars.

The ancient book of Job, in the Bible, (written thousands of years ago) contains some fascinating verses where God describes to Job how He alone has the power to control the uncontrollable and (in the time of Job) the unknowable aspects of creation. In Job 38:31-33, God says to Job "Can you direct the movement of the stars, binding the cluster of the Pleiades, or loosening the cords of Orion? Can you direct the constellations through the seasons or guide the Bear with her cubs across the heavens?

Pleiades is an open star cluster consisting of stars within a single cosmic cloud. A gravitational attraction holds them together, like a flock of birds, as they move in a south-easterly direction (as we know it). Quite remarkably these stars travel together at the same speed, and they stay together, defying scientific

We found the car park near the bridge and negotiated the track through the trees to the pool. On our way we met a grey squirrel scampering along and then disappearing over a large hanging branch. The early evening sun had begun to fade a little but still shone brightly over the pool. Sadly in more recent times, a rather unsightly weir had been built and I was left to imagine how it looked in Byron's day. Brookes wrote of his great friend:

Still in the dawnlit waters cool His ghostly Lordship swims his pool, And tries the strokes, essays the tricks, Long learnt on Hellespont, or Styx

My imagination began to run riot as I thought of these great poets, writers and philosophers, Brooks, Byron and Woolf often enjoying their swim nude. The freedom of it all captured for me the spirit of the moment! Could I? Should I? I swam around for a little while imagining how Byron, Woolf and Brookes must have felt, a moment in time, a moment to treasure

After I emerged from the waters and started to dress, a couple of fishermen emerged from the trees. Perhaps Byron didn't care who came along the footpath in his day. He was king of all he surveyed, he had the moral authority to do whatever he liked and for just a while, I was him....

In the car park, we found a free museum dedicated to the great man. I have often wondered what made someone a truly iconic figure, Brookes was certainly one. I guess you have to die young and have done something truly exceptional. Marilyn Monroe, James Dean, Rupert Brooks, they all fitted the bill.

'O BE JOYFUL' - CHOIRS SING AGAIN AT LAST!

The last 18 months have been difficult for us all, but those who sing in choirs have been particularly hard hit with many unable to sing together since March 2020. Now restrictions are lifting Wareham Choral Society is planning a return to music making in September



2021. Their Monday evening rehearsals at Lady St Mary's Church will include the standard Christmas fare including carols and excerpts from Handel's "Messiah" but also an exciting newly commissioned work. The "Dorset Jubilate" has been written for the Choral Society by composer Philip Singleton, and as well as the familiar words of the Jubilate, it incorporates settings of poems by local poet Thomas Hardy – "The Darkling Thrush", and "The Oxen" which adds a Christmas feel to the piece due to be first performed on 4th December 2021 in a concert with Briantspuddle Singers.

Composer Philip Singleton says: "It is my sincere hope that the "Dorset Jubilate" should contain something to appeal to all... and what better to set that poems by Thomas Hardy. The Jubilate Deo (Psalm 100) invites Christians to be joyful and to praise God, while Hardy's poem "The Oxen" takes the form of a pastoral carollike setting, and "The Darkling Thrush", in which a lone wanderer on the point of despair finds solace in the song of an unseen thrush – suggested here by solo trumpet."

The "Dorset Jubilate" is scored for Choir, Soprano and Baritone Soloists, and obligato trumpet, all supported by an important and exciting organ part. Philip has worked in close collaboration with Wareham Choral Society's Musical Director, Hazel Ricketts, and John Challenger, organist of Salisbury Cathedral.


Hazel Ricketts comments that "The results of this collaboration are obvious in both a dramatic organ part which complements and supports the choir, and choral writing which is crafted to be approachable and singable for an amateur choir. However the real joy is in the piece as a whole, and the way in which all elements fit together to make a new and exciting, yet still moving, choral work reflecting our mixed feelings at this strange time".

NEWS FROM WESTMINSTER

As I write my column this week, pupils across the country are getting their A level and GCSE results. I want to congratulate them all—it has clearly been a very challenging year for our young people. I know that universities, colleges and apprenticeship placements are working hard to ensure that students get the places that they want and that are best for them. I also thank all the teachers who have worked incredibly hard throughout the pandemic, and will also be working in the holidays to support





pupils as they decide their next steps.

On the subject of education, I am going to be very involved in the Education (Freedom of Spech) Bill Committee when the House of Commons returns in September. Part of my role is to help

organise the sittings for Bill Committees. A Bill Committee is where MPs from all parties can scrutinise the language and structure of proposed legislation, and it is also a time when outside organisations and the public can contribute to the debate through oral or written evidence. This is an important part of helping MPs to decide if the laws that are being proposed are actually workable in the real world, and for those people who will be affected. It is important that all there is enough time allowed for this, so careful planning and preparation is made for the Bill Committee to sit. Bill Committees are public, so they are recorded by Hansard, and anyone can read the evidence and the debate.

Over the summer recess I have been liaising with MPs and civil servants to make arrangements for this committee when we return to Parliament in September, when we will spend several sessions a week over 3 weeks scrutinising the legislation. It is concerned with the important topic of freedom of speech and academic freedom within Higher Education. You can read the full test of the Bill here https://bills.parliament.uk/bills/2862

As we continue getting back to normal, sadly during the pandemic scammers have taken advantage of the situation, and there has been a marked increase in scam texts and emails. There is lots of helpful advice from the National Cyber

Brooke was the unofficial leader of the Grantchester Group that used to meet at Orchard House for tea when he came to live in Grantchester in 1909 shortly before his death in the great



war. Among his friends were philosopher Bertram Russell, novelist E M Forster, economist Maynard Keynes, writer Virginia Woolf and artist Augustus John, a very distinguished group of Cambridge academics.

It sounded an idyllic way of life with Brooke spending his days studying, running to Haslingfield in the morning, swimming in the river and commuting to Cambridge by canoe. Life must have been rather wonderful if you were rich in those far off days where life was led at a gentler pace and there was time to stop and stare, perhaps even to smell the roses?

Diana was to be my backup so we agreed that I should swim downstream and that she would meet me at the tea rooms. I began my swim down the river as it wound its way through glorious Cambridgeshire countryside. A blackbird tweeted on the riverbank and I stopped a while taking in the cacophony of sound as the birds were also enjoying the moment. A couple of swans glided gracefully by looking serene and elegant. At times, I had to ease my way through some rather prolific water weed that had built up from the river bed. I am told that herons and kingfishers are often seen along the banks of the river.

We arrived in the village to be greeted by the morning sun beating down from a glorious blue Cambridgeshire sky. Our short journey had in a few short miles taken us out of the bustling city through leafy lanes to the centre of the village.

Parking alongside the Red Lion pub, we made our way along the narrow footpath past the church and the famous Orchard Tea Rooms and





found ourselves standing outside the Old Vicarage now the home of Jeffery and Mary Archer. A rather plush Jaguar stood on the gravel drive and the bronze statue of Rupert Brooke who used to live there, looked mighty impressive if not a touch ostentatious.

The tree lined path looked inviting and we walked along it to the Mill Pond to be met by a couple of friendly canoeists, their paddles and canoes hoisted aloft coming

up from the river bank. "Yes, it's that way" they responded to our enquiries "Lovely morning!".

Indeed it was the kind of day in an English country village that the homesick Rupert Brooke yearned for all those years ago. DORSET COUNCIL- WEST PURBECK REPORT

Lulworth and Durdle Door Working Group

This group continues to meet regularly to monitor issues arising from tourists coming to Dorset. The group is chaired by the Police and has our two Councillors on it plus representatives from Highways, the various estates and traffic management. We have implemented a series of temporary road management systems to cater for peaks





in numbers. Many of the actions have implications across the whole of Dorset.

Housing Numbers in the Local Plan

I have been asked to circulate further information about how the housing numbers for the Local Plan were worked out. These used the government's national standard methodology for the calculation of Local Housing Need, as explained below. Apologies for the rather technical nature of the explanation

The Local Housing Need calculation. The standard calculation is based on national datasets and has four steps. Step 1: setting the baseline using the 2014 based household projections (household projections are published by the Office for National Statistics every other year, but government requires us to use the 2014-based projections) Step 2: applying an affordability uplift based on median workplace-based affordability ratios (these are published annually and the results will change each year so will need to be updated as the plan progresses) Step 3: applying a cap where appropriate. Step 4: adding on the 'cities and large urban areas uplift' where it applies.

The baseline is the annualised household growth over the next 10-year period starting with the current year – for the consultation document this was 1,300 per annum. The affordability ratio was 10.06 and the adjustment is calculated using a specified formula but gave a multiplier of 1.38. Applying the adjustment to the baseline gives a local housing need requirement of

 $1,300 \times 1.38 = 1,794$ dwellings per annum. Over the 17-year plan period this equates to 30,498 dwellings. (NB the local plan document gives figures of 1,793 and 30,481 – the difference is because of rounding; in the local plan itself we have used figures to four decimal places).

A cap is only applicable where the local housing need requirement is 40% above

the higher of either the baseline household growth figure or the most recently adopted housing requirement figure. It did not therefore apply to this calculation. Dorset does not contain one of the 'top 20 cities and urban areas' that qualify for the additional 35% uplift and therefore this was not applied.

Local Plan - revised timescale

The timetable has been revised because of the extremely large response to the initial consultation plus a series of questions requiring further work, by the government Inspector. The revised (aspirational) plan is as follows

- Publication of response analysis January 2022
- Cabinet March 2022
- Consultation May 2022
- Responses and analysis Summer 2022
- Cabinet September 2022
- Submission late 2022

Once the plan is submitted the timetable will be almost entirely dependent on the Inspector, but we are still aiming for agreement by early 2024.

Community Governance Review (CGR)

As a reminder, the areas that CGRs cover are:

- Creating, merging, altering or abolishing parishes (grouping or de-grouping parishes)
- Increasing or decreasing the number of Councillors
- Creating ward boundaries or changing existing Warding arrangements
- Changes to Parish names
- Correcting minor boundary anomalies.
- Changing a parish council into a parish meeting

The responsibility of undertaking CGRs falls to the principal council (Dorset Council in this case) and can be triggered in a number of ways including a request from a parish, a community petition or, as in this case, at the principal council's volition. As a principal council, we are required to undertake a review of governance arrangements of all parishes every 10-15 years and Full Council on 15 July agreed that now was the appropriate time to carry out a council-wide review. The leaislation that covers CGRs requires any Review to be completed

within 12 months of Dorset Council publishing its Terms of Reference, although any changes to governance arrangements agreed as part of the Review cannot take effect until the next scheduled elections in May 2024. A copy of the Terms of Reference document can be found at www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/community-governance-review.

The process that Dorset Council will follow will be:

- Publication of Terms of reference that sets out what will be covered in this
 case it will be a review of all parishes that sit within the Dorset Council area
 (22 July 2021).
- Public consultation for 12 weeks seeking proposals/initial submissions (5 August to 28 October 2021).
- Consideration of consultation responses and preparation of draft recommendations (to be agreed by Full Council December 2021).
- Public consultation on draft recommendations (20 December 2021 28 February 2022).
- Consideration of further responses and then publication of final recommendations. (to be agreed by Full Council – April 2022)

We have written to all Parishes, voluntary organisations and other potentially interested organisations with the detailed timetable. When preparing any submissions, we recommend that the parishes take into account the considerations that Dorset Council will need to apply that are set out in the Local Government Boundary Commission for England Guidance already provided to all Parish Councils: That is:

- The need to secure that community governance within the area under review:
 - reflects the identities and interests of the community in that area.
 - is effective and convenient.
- The impact of community governance arrangements on community cohesion and the size, population and boundaries of a local community or parish.
- The impact on electorate size of future development within the next 5 years.

We will be able to assist by providing street lists with elector numbers, and we have also provided figures for the 5-year projected future developments in the consultation document.

Any changes will be set out in a Reorganisation Order – the Order will include a detailed map of any boundary changes with any changes taking effect at the

The Council budget

The council is currently forecasting to exceed its budget for this year by £8.3m. (2.76%). However there remains a large degree of financial uncertainty and if the local economic recovery picks up, the council could start to move towards financial balance during the latter part of this financial year. The significant financial burden placed on Dorset Council to deliver services against a backdrop of increasing need and considerably less income during the pandemic continues to be felt in all areas of the business. The council has a legal duty to provide educational support for children with special needs and disabilities and this level of need continues to rise. In addition, there are more people than previously forecast entering council-funded care because of the 'accelerated discharge from hospital' programme due to the pressures on the NHS from COVID.

We continue to lobby central Government for fairer funding. Dorset Council has not had, long-term, financial planning information from Government since its establishment in April 2019.

Purbeck "wilder grazing"

The Purbeck Heaths are n a t i o n a l l y a n d internationally important for rare and threatened wildlife. To ensure that the amazing diversity of wildlife that inhabits the heaths can not only survive but thrive, a partnership of the RSPB, National Trust, Natural England and Dorset Area of



Outstanding Natural Beauty are expanding the naturalised grazing system at National Trust's Hartland Moor and Natural England's Stoborough Heath to encompass RSPB Arne.

The project will create a "mini-New Forest" in the area between Stoborough, Corfe Castle and Arne near Wareham, with cattle, ponies and pigs roaming across an area of 1370 ha at the heart of the Purbeck Heaths National Nature Reserve. Different breeds of cattle, ponies and pigs will be used to create the greatest possible variety of grazing and trampling across the area. By allowing animals to range freely across a large area, they will both be able to restore natural patterns of habitat and help to spread different species across the landscape.

This type of grazing system used to be much more common, and examples still exist today, including nearby in the New Forest. In Purbeck, the partnership will be more than doubling the area currently under such a grazing system and also introducing pias, for their unique ability to assist this natural process.

Love Dorset campaign

As you will all be aware, high levels of anti-social behaviour from some visitors to Dorset have been reported. Incidents like fires caused by disposable BBQs, copious amounts of littering on our beaches, illegal camping, discarded tents and vehicles parked inconsiderately, were all of concern to Dorset's residents and caused council officers a great deal of additional work.

To address some of these issues, Dorset Council has developed a campaign called 'Promise to Love Dorset'. It has been funded through the COVID Operations Management Fund (COMF). The campaign is based on evidence which suggests behaviours can be changed using positive reinforcement rather than telling people off or shaming them. Our aim was to win over hearts and minds through a multi-partner approach. Through highly targeted digital marketing, would-be visitors to Dorset from all over the country will see the videos and social media graphics. The click through results so far are very encouraging with more than 1 million people already reached and 90,000 interactions to date and we expect that this figure will increase significantly.



Visitors to Dorset are being asked to value our unique environment, our oftenperilous coastline and respect our residents in a series of short videos each featuring a different 'promise' and using a mix of humour and serious messaging to encourage responsible and sustainable tourism. The campaign is hosted on Visit-Dorset.com

and our landowning partners, like the National Trust, Forestry England and RSPB, have all helped to shape the campaign and are working with us to share the messages.

This is not the only action the council has taken in terms of preparing for high numbers of visitors. We have more waste services in place and employees on shifts to keep popular destinations clean, we have additional civil enforcement officers and new tow away zones in place to address irresponsible parking and robust traffic management schemes in place for road closures as and when

beach car parks reach capacity. We also have new volunteer ambassadors welcoming visitors to visitor hotspots, giving information on the local area.

New Housing Register

Changes to how residents can apply and be assessed for social housing in the Dorset Council area have now been introduced.

re-registrations will be assessed against the new criteria outlined in the Dorset Council Home Choice policy (these are on the website). The council will write to anyone who re-applies with the outcome of their assessment.

Right to vote

Dorset residents are being asked to check their electoral registration details are correct to make sure they retain their right to vote in future elections and referendums. Letters have been sent to all households as part of an annual canvass to identify any residents who are not registered to vote, or whose details are not correct. Although the majority of households will not have to take action if their details are up to date, it is important everyone follows the instructions on the form that they should have received by now. BERE REGIS HISTORY SOCIETY

DOMESTIC POTTERY VESSELS AT BERE

The total number of pottery sherds founds near the known Villa sites around Bere is now at a total of 7,050 pieces ranging in size from less than a centimetre to much larger pieces, some over ten centimetres. They are of all eras

during the previous two thousand years, although the Anglo-Saxon/Viking period (418 to 1066) amounts to only 3.2% of the finds because from the 6th century they mostly used wooden bowls, which of course, no longer exist in our soil especially.



Whilst sorting and boxing-up our extensive collection it was decided to measure the diameters of suitable rim-pieces from each era to find out what sizes were the most popular by the kiln operators and the customers themselves. Human nature seems to remain much the same and it was found that for the whole 2,000 years the sizes available were in two inch increments between 4 inches and 18 inches in diameter.

During the Romano-British era bowls of 12 inches diameter were the most common, then the next reasonable sample, the Mediaeval (or 11th to 16th century) again shows that 12 inch diameter bowls were the most common too. The other sizes were represented in the finds, with the smaller being soup-type bowls

and the larger being cooking or heating vessels. The final era shown in our finds was the Early-Modern (1700-1900) and here there was a slight change, with 14 inch bowls being the most numerous. This probably reflects the increasing use of metal containers for cooking, although the larger sizes still show in our finds.

This might be the first time that this sort of analysis has been made, especially for finds at Bere Regis. It is somewhat reassuring that the sizes of our pots, pans and bowls show a consistency that might still be seen in our own kitchens.

Waste and Recycling information

Below is a personal message from Jill Haynes the Cabinet portfolio holder for waste to all Councillors.

You will all appreciate how incredibly hard our staff from Dorset Waste have worked during the pandemic. I am writing today to flag up the pressures we are currently under with staff availability due to a combination of factors. We are getting a number of staff being asked to self-isolate through track and trace, this is at a time when there is a national shortage of HGV drivers and agency provision. We also have staff with much deserved and needed annual leave booked. The combination of these factors has led to us have concerns about cover for some areas. At the moment we are managing but it is a close call. We will always collect black bin and food waste, but our policy is that, if we have to, we will take staff from the garden waste and or recycling rounds to ensure cover. If we need to do this, I will ensure that local members are informed, there is appropriate comms and that those affected receive a refund. We hope that this is not needed but I felt that I had to warn you of the pressures on the service and would ask for your support locally.

Verge Cutting

This seems to be a current hot topic and I have summarised an article from our countryside manager below. The detailed policy is on the website

There is a huge opportunity for verges to be managed more sympathetically to help



compensate for the 97% reduction in UK wildflower meadows since the 1930s. Dorset Council has significantly changed the way we manage many of our verges in the last few years to do more than ever to protect, conserve and enhance the verges in Dorset for biodiversity. These changes include, increasing the amount of 'cut and collect' mowing for the verges within the 30-mph urban road network – this is where we collect the vegetation clippings instead of letting them decompose into the soil. Collecting the grass clippings reduces the soil fertility, resulting in lower growth rates, longer periods between cutting and a far better environment for wildflowers to establish and thrive; in some examples a reduction from 7 cuts a year to 2 has been achieved within towns and verges full of wildflowers. This reduction in verge cutting allows wildflowers the time to complete their life cycles which benefits bees and other pollinators. This method

also saves time and reduces fuel consumption, further aiding the environment.

Dorset Council now cut the B and C class rural road network once instead of twice. Previously all rural roads (40 mph and above) received two cuts per year with a side arm flail. This is now reduced to one cut, from late June /July onwards. This ensures not all the verges are cut in a similar time and many flowers complete their life cycles uninterrupted before cutting.

We are creating verges which have been designated Sites of Nature Conservation Interest (SNCIs) by Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT). Working with DWT, we hope to create, by good management, more verges of SNCI quality due to the diversity of herbaceous species present. Some verges already have high biodiversity value. These are known as "conservation verges". These verges avoid the first cut and are then cut as usual later in the summer.

This package of measures ensures that biodiversity can thrive on more of our verges each year. While we have reduced cutting, it is important to remember that for wildflowers to exist on our verges, they will still need some cutting. Too little cutting results in verges turning to bramble and scrub, which would prevent wildflowers from living on our verges.



Many may think it is a paradox, but if we want good populations of wildflowers, we will inevitably need to sometimes cut verges with wildflowers present. The vast majority of any cut flowers will soon bloom again between cuts, so don't be too alarmed if you sometimes see mowers cutting verges where wildflowers are present.

Some urban verges are still cut conventionally 5 or 6 times a year using mowers that leave the clippings behind to decompose into the soil. Over time we hope to reduce this method and move to more "cut and collect" mowing on the urban verges, reducing the number of cuts and collecting the clippings. Please note it is dangerous to maintain verges, and members of the public should avoid doing it themselves. However, if you or a group are interested in performing maintenance tasks in your community, then please contact our Coast and Countryside service. Control of weeds on highway hard services, e.g., kerb edges, is done with a biodegradable herbicide. This work is carried out once or twice a year during the growing season. This helps reduce weeds and maintain the integrity of Highway infrastructure.



29th July - 963 vehicles counted. On this occasion Dorset Police were present and used their laser which noted 1 car at 36mph.

30 July - 876 vehicles counted. 49 were travelling at over 30 mph and 12 over 36 mph

1 August – This was an extra CSW session with Dorset Police. Due to weather, monitoring was only undertaken for half an hour, during which time 273 vehicles were counted with 3 cars at 36mph or above

 9^{th} August – 403 vehicles were counted, with 71 travelling over 30mph and 21 over 36mph

Elder Road Path Improvements

With Winter rapidly approaching, the decision has been taken to upgrade the Elder Road path, running alongside the stream. This path was originally installed in 2012 and, due to natural wear and tear, now has many areas where water gathers, and it gets very muddy. The path work will be undertaken during September and will include an element of drainage and adjusting the camber of the path in order to prevent water lying.

Romance Scams

Romance scams are crimes that break the hearts of victims, not only because of the financial loss they suffer, but also because of the loss of the relationships they believed were genuine. Thousands of people lose money to romance frauds each year after being conned on internet dating sites and social networks.

Scammers set up fake profiles, fake photos and claim to be from other parts of the world, for example the United States. The scammer weaves a story of a successful person working overseas, and presents themselves as a thoughtful, caring and loving individual who is looking for their soul mate. The scammers are good at what they do; they ask lots of questions of the victim about what they want in their lives.

They then use the information and turn it into a dream that becomes a reality to the victim. They use words we all like to hear to win their



victim's heart, and they use psychology to hold them in their spell. Once they have established a relationship then the scamming begins. In all cases the plea for financial assistance is the key to the scam. This can be for assistance in cashing a cheque that they are unable to cash themselves, or asking for financial assistance to help them out of a difficulty they are having. For example, they were mugged, or involved in an accident, and are in hospital but cannot pay their hospital bill, or they are desperate to come to visit but need help with the money to manage that.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Thanks to our WI members for sharing their favourites

Fruit and Jam Cake.

This is an easy way to use up that last apple, pear or plum in the fruit bowl that no one wants.

Ingredients

- 250g butter plus extra for greasing
- 250g granulated sugar
- Zest of 1 lemon
- 4 eggs
- 250g plain flour
- 1 eating apple peeled, cored, diced. (or pear, plum, blueberries)
- 3 Tbsp apricot jam

Method

- 1. Preheat oven 170c/150c fan/gas 3.5. Grease a loaf tin and line.
- 2. Cream together butter, sugar and lemon zest till pale and creamy.
- 3. Add the eggs one at a time and beat well after each, this is the most important section.
- 4. Fold in the flour and pour into the tin.
- 5. Drop in the diced apple or fruit of your choice and swirl through the mixture with a knife.
- 6. Smooth the top and dollop the jam along the centre and then using the tip of a knife zig zag the jam in a pattern
- 7. Bake for approx 1hr until a skewer inserted in the middle come out clean.
- 8. When cool dust with icing sugar



BERE REGIS WILDLIFE AND ENVIRONMENT GROUP

Despite the somewhat indifferent weather and the 'restrictions' we do hope you've enjoyed your Summer, whether it was spent locally or away. As we now enter Autumn and the season of mellow fruitfulness, we can take pleasure in the rich colours of ripening fruit in the hedgerows and maybe enjoy



picking and eating some blackberries! Enjoy them, but do leave some for our wildlife. There are also many other fruits, seeds and nuts to be found in the area, sustaining wildlife. You'll see plenty of hazel nuts shells on the ground, but be lucky to find any nuts ripe enough to eat yourself - the mice and squirrels always seem to get there first!

Souls Moor

Take a walk through Souls Moor and you'll see a mix of areas of short grass that have been nibbled down by the ponies, areas that have been trampled by their hooves and areas of longer vegetation. This mix of habitats is excellent - just what is needed to sustain a rich variety of wildlife. This becomes very clear when watching birds within Souls Moor. Some birds, particularly larger ones, will be ferreting around on the ground for bugs, grubs and seeds while generally smaller birds will be flitting from stalk to stalk within areas of longer vegetation feasting on the ripening seeds.

Hoverflies

As well as bees, the most prolific pollinators are hoverflies, aptly named as they hover motionless sometimes in front of you and then dart rapidly from one flower to another. There are 283 different ones in the UK and vary from minute black ones to large ones that can easily be mistaken for bees. Here are 2 examples photographed in the village. One of the largest is the rather ferocious looking, but harmless, Volucella zonaria, and the



second, the charming small *Episyrphus balteatus*, commonly known as the Marmalade Fly. Shown here on knapweed in Mays Wood. To encourage them,



the larvae of many of them grow in wet rotting wood, so it is good to keep a small pile of damp dead wood in the corner of your garden!

Conservation Working Parties

Over recent years our volunteers at the conservation working parties have really helped to improve the wildlife value of the

natural habitats alongside the stream and at Souls Moor. For obvious reasons they have not taken place over the past 18 months. However, fingers crossed, they will recommence in October.
