





Something I find very comforting, particularly in the times we are living in is a verse from the book of Psalms, 'In God I trust, and will not fear' Psalm 56 v4. Wherever we are and whatever is going on in our lives, God is with us in the mess and the muddle, in the joy and the sadness, reaching out to connect with us. BISHOP'S LETTER

Our days are filled with calls upon our time and attention. Among the least welcome are the cold sales calls that intersperse our day – those anonymous, brief exchanges with callers who address us by the name of a long-forgotten tenant of our home, and with whom no kind of even fleeting relationship is possible. Several times a week, we might rush from the bathtub, meal table or meeting to pick up the phone, only to be asked whether we are the householder - and feel our heart sink and blood pressure begin to rise.



The poor fools who work in call centres have my pity - only because I was one of them for a while. I was selling advertising for a local newspaper. I found making cold calls so impossibly awkward, I even tended to depart from the usual script and began my sales pitch with 'I'm so sorry for bothering you", you probably won't want this', and 'you must feel free to say no, but I have to call you....' Just occasionally, this grovelling approach actually worked, and one could have a proper conversation. I lasted but five months on the job.

Then there are other calls: calls which are so surprising, so welcome, that life seems to open up with their appearance. These little epiphanies can come through the phone – in the good news of a job offer or an unexpected invitation. But, equally, they come in other ways: someone in need, for example, whose call upon our assistance somehow makes us more human; or perhaps in the form of a sudden revelation – like a film or piece of music, perhaps, which might fill us with a sense of expectancy, or expresses our yearning so deeply that we are renewed. These kinds of encounters not only inspire us, but they also ask something of us and call us forward into a different way of life.

'Behold' says the risen Christ in the Bible: 'I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice, and opens the door, I will come in, and will eat with him, and he with me.' Scripture invites us to imagine Christ as an unexpected caller: one who will not barge in, but patiently waits for our response. He does not want a minute of our time, or have an unrepeatable special offer, but comes to meet us so that we might follow where he will lead. The Lord's arrival in our midst is the wonder of this season: bearing the light of the world, he calls us forth. As with gladness so many have done before, may we also follow.

years the PC feels that provision should be made for a salt bin to be located there so that salt can be spread when ice occurs or is likely to occur.

The proposal is for a black salt-bin to be purchased at a cost of £70 (67cm high x88.5cm long x 61.5cm wide). The first annual fill will be supplied by Dorset Council free of charge, with any further fills being charged to the Parish Council. The effectiveness of this facility does depend on local volunteers salting the road at appropriate times.

Southover Farm Slurry Lagoon

A second Liaison Group Meeting was held at the beginning of December and those present were informed that the slurry lagoon would be operational within a couple of weeks. Some increased traffic to and from the farm is anticipated over the course of a month as the lagoon is filled but movements will then settle down. The lagoon will not be operational over the summer. The Liaison Group will meet again in March 2022 when the impact on the community of traffic movements will be evaluated in advance of the autumn and winter. Anyone with concerns relating to the operation of the slurry lagoon should initially contact the Parish Council Clerk.

"As well as members of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers, every flower club and every church from the Diocese of Salisbury has been invited to take part," said Michael.

He added that the festival would be environmentally friendly, as arrangers would be using compostable substitutes for floral foam, and a section of the displays would focus on bees and other pollinators.


Well, 2021 has gone now, and we are starting 2022.

AFFPUDDLE AND TURNERSPUDDLE PARISH COUNCIL

Precept 2022/23

The majority of the Parish Council's income comes from the precept which is a charge shared amongst Council taxpayers and paid to Parish Council's by Dorset Council. At the December meeting the Parish Council voted to maintain the charge per household so that residents will not face an increase to their payments that come to the Parish Council. The amount that the Parish Council receives for the year will increase to £11,261.44 in 2022 as more households are liable to pay Council tax. The extra income will be used to cover the increases in the Parish Council's expenses due to inflation, as well as allowing a budget for highways initiatives which the Parish Council is currently considering.

Traffic Survey for the B3390

Parish Councillors are keen to carry out a traffic survey on the B3390 to establish the number of vehicles using this stretch of road through the Parish. The information will be used to extrapolate what total traffic movements might be if proposals in the Local Plan for housing development in Moreton and Crossways move forward. In the first instance the Parish Council asked Dorset Council to fund this initiative. Unfortunately, no budget was not available and as result Parish Councillors resolved to fund the survey. It is likely that the survey will be carried out towards the summer of 2022 at an estimated cost of £250.

Litter Pick

Many thanks to all those who attended the community litter pick on the morning of Saturday 20th November 2021. The event was very successful, and the Parish Council aims to organise the usual litter pick again in the coming spring.

Salt Bin – Briantspuddle Crossroads

The Parish Council has a Snow plan which aims to clear a way through from Briantspuddle Crossroads to the B3390 at Affpuddle. This route in and out of the village has been chosen because it is a short, flat section of road to clear and maintain clearance which links to a road that Dorset Council commit to salt.

In addition, it has been noticed over the years that the crossroads is particularly prone to icing and it is also well used by pedestrians for a variety of reasons. Because dangerous falls on ice are known to have taken place there in recent

Eddie, always considered himself a German first, a Jew second. He was proud of his country. But all that changed in November 1938 when he was beaten, arrested and taken to a concentration camp. Over the next seven years, Eddie faced unimaginable horrors every day, first in Buchenwald, then in Auschwitz, then on a Nazi death march. He lost family, friends, and his country.

Before the war he had more than a hundred relatives all over Europe. As the war ended, as far as he knew there was only him. But he writes: "Liberation is freedom, but freedom for what?" "To be alone?"

"To have to say Kaddish (a Jewish Prayer) for other people? "That's not life, I was very sad, I was very lonely. I had to decide what to do, to live or to find a tablet and die like my parents. I had made a promise to myself and to God, to live the best existence I could, or else my parents' deaths would be for nothing. So I chose to live."

His principles of living are so very simple and basic, but also very profound.

"A vow to smile every day; meeting evil with kindness; believing happiness is something we can choose; having one good friend is enough; affirming life can be beautiful if you make it beautiful. It is up to you." His memoir is inspirational as he pays tribute to those who were lost by telling his story, and sharing his wisdom. As we read of so much evil in our world today, and wonder how to survive, this book will encourage you.

St Paul, in the Bible, gave similar advice. In the book of Philippians, Chapter 3v4-9, he wrote the following "Rejoice in the Lord always, I will say it again, Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Whatever is true, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things,and the God of peace will be with you."

When we are finding life difficult, for whatever reason, those words in the New Testament, could become our New Year resolution. Think only good thoughts, be thankful in every situation, don't be anxious, talk to God about your problems and trust Him to help you, and you will know God's peace. In this very uncertain world that sounds like good advice to me!

We have a good example in Eddie Jaku, his positive attitude has contributed to his long life.

When things are hard, try following God's recipe for a peaceful and positive life.

May 2022 be a new start for each of us, with Jesus in control of our lives.



NEWS FROM WESTMINSTER

The New Year is often a time to reflect, to look back, and also to make resolutions for the year ahead. As I am often asked how MPs prioritise competing calls on their time, and given the time of year, I have looked back and I will give a brief overview and summary of the past 12 months. Of course, due to the pandemic Parliamentary working practices have been different from normal, but legislation still needs scrutiny and debate, decisions affecting the country and our area need to be made, and constituents rightly ask me questions and also for help.



Looking back, I have attended Parliament every week that it has been sitting, other than when I had to self-isolate due to covid. I have voted in person more often than almost any other MP, in over 200 different votes, ranging from strengthening the law around domestic abuse, to fishing rights, to improving air standards and biodiversity. I have also attended numerous sitting Fridays, where I have supported a number of Private Members' Bills passing to the next stage, including careers guidance in schools; increased sentencing for people who abuse animals; and the Down Syndrome Bill to increase support for people with Down's Syndrome.

As I have mentioned before, part of my role in Parliament involves looking at Bills in committee, and this year I have sat on 6 different Bill Committees, involving 33 sessions of evidence taking and line by line scrutiny. Again, this is something of a record! These have included bills concerning education, including the Freedom of Speech Bill, and Skills Bill, getting employers more involved in higher education.

In the constituency I have held almost 50 constituency surgeries, right across the constituency, and also by phone. It's obviously not been as easy to see people in person this year, but I have undertaken as many visits as possible. This has included seeing a wide range of people, including schools, hospitals, vaccination centres, charities, businesses and individuals. I have been quizzed by schoolchildren and church groups, and had meetings with local councillors, the Clinical Commissioning Group and the Police & Crime Commissioner. If you run or work in a business or a charity, and you would like to highlight what you are doing, please do get in touch and invite me to come and see for myself!

On a more personal level, I have sent over 3000 letters to constituents, and over 2000 emails have been sent from my office. I have contacted nearly every government department with wide-ranging queries from constituents. But supporting constituents is not about numbers, or data. It's about knowing that

Large Military vehicles through Wool

We were notified of military vehicles travelling through Wool and past the school. We contacted the Army and they have issued the following clarification.

Large military vehicles should not be transiting to and from Lulworth Camp through Wool village. Previous offenders were traced to civilian contractors transporting



military vehicles to Lulworth through Wool because they were following SatNav directions. The contractors concerned were contacted and reminded of the route they should be using. 


COVID vaccinations

With the age groups and timings for second vaccinations and boosters being extended the vaccination clinic at Wareham will continue into the New Year. It has been a difficult service for them to provide at times with the guidelines continually changing at short notice. There was a period where a large number



of patients from out of the Purbeck area were booking at Wareham, but this has now been resolved and there should continue to be sufficient access for Purbeck patients.

Text messages are being sent to patients when the next cohort of patients is being booked. If we don't have a mobile phone number on your medical record we will phone or write to you inviting you to make an appointment



This is a targeted consultation that specifically relates to those policies for Green Belt release and a holiday park at Morden (policies I5 [Morden Holiday Park and Strategic SANG] and V2 [Green Belt]) – we will not be attaching any weight to any comments received on other policies in the local plan (there has been ample opportunity to comment more widely on all of the local plan's policies through earlier consultations and during the examination hearings sessions).

The procedure for making a response is as follows. We will be individually notifying those people who have previously made a response on the local plan (the consultation will also be more widely publicised with posters, a press release and social media engagement). The consultation is due to open on 6 December 2021 and will close on the 24 January 2022.

People will be able to view copies of consultation documents in local libraries and online through the council's website. If people decide that they would like to make a representation on the revisions to Policies I5 and V2 they will need to make their response in writing and complete a response form prepared by the council. Responses can be made electronically by e-mailing completed forms to the council or on paper forms addressed to:

Purbeck Local Plan Proposed Further Main Modifications Consultation, Dorset Council, South Walks House, South Walks Road; Dorchester, DT1 1UZ. We will not accept anonymous responses – it is important that people sign their form and share their contact details.

After the consultation closes, we will collate responses and prepare a consultation response document (which summarises the issues raised) and we will share copies of all the responses and the consultation response document with the Inspector. After considering the issues the Inspector will prepare a final report early next year and decide how to proceed.

Dorset Council Youth Grant Funding

Dorset Council's Youth Fund grant provides funding for initiatives that deliver youth projects and activities within the Dorset Council area. This fund is to support community-based youth centres and clubs to deliver a range of positive activities for young people and to help with Covid-19 recovery plans. The closing date is 17th January. Details are on the website or give me a ring.

Planning Applications – the process

I have been asked to explain the process for considering planning applications plus questions as to whether MPs have any role in the determination of

applications. The piece below has been written by the (member) portfolio holder for planning. I am happy to answer any further questions on this process.

All planning applications are considered on their merits and must be determined in line with adopted Local and Neighbourhood Plans, unless material considerations indicate otherwise. There is a statutory 21-day consultation period for planning applications, and Parish Councils are notified of all planning applications in their area. The officer's report for each application sets out how the application has been assessed, and how any concerns raised in representations have been taken into account. The Council's 'scheme of delegation' (which is on the website) ensures a higher level of scrutiny for applications where the Parish Council's view differs from the officer recommendation: for these applications, there is a consultation with the Chair and Vice-Chair of the relevant planning committee, and Dorset Council ward members, before a decision is taken as to whether the application should be referred to the planning committee. The Council also offers a pre-application advice service. One of the aims of pre-application advice is to improve the quality of development in Dorset, by helping to shape proposals at an early stage. No decisions are made at the pre-application stage. Pre-application advice is made publicly available online once a related planning application is received, subject to commercial confidentiality rules. As Planning is a Local Authority function and not a national one, no additional weight is given to any influence from Members of Parliament, which is evidenced by there not being a separate slot for them to speak at Planning committees.

I hope that this gives you reassurance that there is no manipulation of planning applications through the system and that all are given unbiased consideration either by an Area Committee (if that is triggered through the constitution) or under delegated powers carried out by unbiased, highly qualified Planning officers.

Fund for supporting Dorset Residents

Dorset Council's programme of support for residents in need of financial help this winter is now up and running. Communication activities to support take up of various elements began on 7 December 2021. The council was allocated up to £2,294,941.45 from the Government's Household Support Fund (HSF) to help residents, including vulnerable families, with the cost of food, heating, and other essentials this winter. At least 50 percent of the total funding must be spent on families with children. In terms of the type of support, the expectation is that the HSF should primarily be used to support households in the most need with food, energy, and water bills. It can also be used to support households with essential costs related to those items and with wider essential costs. In exceptional cases of genuine emergency, it can additionally be used to support housing costs where existing housing support schemes do not meet this exceptional need. There are a variety of areas that are eligible, please give me a ring if you need more details.

Carbon neutral

Dorset Council has an active plan for addressing the Climate and Ecological emergency. We have reduced carbon emissions by 17% in 2020/2021 and reduced energy use by21% over the last two years. We are aiming to be carbon neutral by 2040 although we will aim to get there earlier if we possibly can. However, it's is important to note that Dorset Council only accounts for around 1% of the county's carbon footprint and has limited impact on county-wide emissions. The latest government data shows that Dorset emissions have only reduced by 6% since 2017. By continuing with this programme, we hope to secure a greener and cleaner Dorset for future generations.

Tree Planting to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee

Sunday 6 February 2022 will see the seventieth anniversary of Her Majesty The Queen's accession to the throne, marking the first Platinum Jubilee in the long history of British Monarchs. WHAT HOE?

This locally made hoe featured the latest bulletin of The Bere Regis History Society.

It prompted me to write the following response to John Pitfield.

"It looks identical to the hoe I used as a farming student in 1959 in Surrey. The width of the hoe was ground to the correct distance needed between each sugar beet plant in the row.

A sugar beet 'seed' produces a clump of individual seedlings and the tapered ends of the blade were kept very sharp. This allowed the person to



'single ' the clump to allow a single plant to develop to maturity.

'Snicking out' (as it was called) was a skill expedited by careful placement of the sharp end of the hoe combined with a quick twist of the staff of the hoe.

My mentor (who always wore a waistcoat with a watch on a chain when working to indicate his rank amongst the other farmhands) insisted that one kept one's head down until one got to the end of the row (maybe 100 yards). After 5 rows we would pause for a quick ' roll up' consisting of about 5 strands of 'baccy in a Rizla paper. Once lit, it was held in the lips, straight back to the hoeing and would last for about 5 yards until it was in danger of burning one's lips - or moustache.

1/4 acre a day was expected and the rate was £5,10 shillings /acre."

North Street Gate

We heard some complaints from residents of North Street regarding an increase in the number of motorcycles driving up and down North Street and through the pedestrian access by the gate at the Sports Club end, which is in theory prohibited access for any motor vehicles. This area is the responsibility of Dorset Highways. However, due to the dangers this can cause, we have agreed to look into any potential improvements to the gated area, which would stop access for any motorbikes, whilst still allowing access for pushchairs, wheelchairs, bicycles etc, and submit a proposal to to Dorset Highways seeking permission to undertake the improvements.

Budget and Precept Increase

Over the past few years, the increase in the precept has been over 10%. Under the current circumstances, it was agreed that any increase would be kept to a minimum and members agreed an increase of £3,730 or 5%. However, Dorset Council has lowered the Base Rate for Bere Regis, which has had the effect of increasing this to 7.07%. This means that the charge for a Band D property will increase from £105.39 last year to £112.84 this year - an increase of £7.45 for the year. The Precept is the main source of income for the Parish Council and it covers almost everything we do within the parish, such as the Lengthsman Scheme, grant funding, repairs and improvements to all Parish Council owned facilities such as the Play Park, improving and maintaining the rights of way and public areas owned by the council, upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery and the Parish Clerk's salary, along with insurance, licences and other such costs required to keep the Parish neat, tidy and functioning.

Community Cemetery Project

The Council were delighted to be able to help with the recent planting session as part of the Community Cemetery Project organised by Alison Bennett.

Five new trees were planted on 28th November along with many snowdrops and crocus bulbs in the banks of the upper cemetery. The renovation of the shelter is complete, and a lovely sign has been crafted by Rod Osmond and put up in the shelter, all of which was kindly funded by Nisa. We are also siting one of the benches that we had recently purchased in the cemetery. The planting has been registered with the Queens



Green Canopy website and has been awarded a certificate, albeit virtual, and is not official. The project has been a very worthwhile exercise as it had dual benefits to peoples' well-being and to the climate and is a great example of the community working cohesively to improve our environment.

A very HAPPY NEW YEAR to you all. Now is the time to make a resolution to get out and enjoy the abundant wildlife and varied landscapes in our local area and, of course, to come along to one of our conservation working parties.



Join Us on our Conservation Working Parties

Please come and join us at the next Working Party – Saturday 8th January - many hands make for light work; all are welcome (under 16s should be accompanied by an adult). No experience is required, there's a friendly crowd and it is great fun and exercise too! Or, just pop along and find out more about what we are doing.

We will meet by the stream bridge near to the Scout Hut, Elder Road at 10am or you can find us along the river. We normally finish about 12.00. If you have some loppers, secateurs, hand saws or a spade please bring them with you – if you don't, no problem we'll have some spares along with other tools. Our efforts are helping to conserve the best of what is already present along the riverside walkway and is intended to make the area even more wildlife friendly.

Other upcoming work parties will be on the <u>second</u> Saturdays of February and March – same place, same time.

The Value of Dead Wood

You may have noticed that following some of the conservation work parties cut wood has been piled up. This is not because we are lazy and can't be bothered to take it away! Rather, it is intentional – the log piles provide a safe habitat or refuge and food source for many small creatures, including small mammals, small birds and invertebrates. With the actions of fungi along with woodlice, beetles and other creepy crawlies the wood will slowly break down. We also leave larger sections timber where they have fallen for the same reason – they provide a valuable habitat.

Annual Plants

Since Dorset Wildlife Trust acquired Court Farm, now called Wild Woodbury, annual native plants are beginning to appear on bare ground within the stubble on the former cornfields. Under previous intensive farming these fields would have been ploughed and sprayed with herbicide. This no longer happens, and some

We received numerous appreciative emails saying things like how lucky members felt to belong to such a united and friendly club, and how the event had totally lifted their spirits.



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

interesting plants have already germinated from seeds within the ground. A few poppies have germinated, but also a range of annual natives such as scarlet pimpernel and heartsease. Another interesting annual is Annual Dog's Mercury. which is not that common and can be seen in Hove, the field above Froom's Lane. This plant is dioecious which means that it has separate male and female flowers which look quite different and occur on different plants as shown in the attached pictures.





Starling Murmaration

Starling murmarations occur over the winter months and are an amazing sight. Some are on a massive scale with many thousands of birds. A murmaration is basically a mass aerial display with the starlings swooping

and diving in unison forming constantly shifting clouds of birds. It is thought that starlings do it for many reasons. Grouping together offers safety in numbers – predators find it hard to target one bird in the middle of a large moving flock. The birds also gather to keep warm at night and to exchange information, such as good feeding areas. The birds gather over their roosting site, and perform their wheeling stunts before they roost for the night. In previous years there have been some modest sized murmarations locally, at the Souls Moor end of the Watercress Beds. The best viewing time now would be between 3.30 and 4pm – keep your eyes peeled and let us know if you see anything.

Let Us Know What Wildlife You Have Seen

To many of us the Little Egret and the Kingfisher will be familiar sights along Bere Stream. Buzzards and Kestrels are frequent visitors at Souls Moor over the winter

period as earthworms are forced to the surface by the rising water table and provide easy and nutritious pickings. There are also other visitors that we only see at this time of year, for example redwing and fieldfare. These are migratory birds arriving at our shores from Scandinavia to escape the winter cold there. They may be seen on hedges, scrub and woodland feasting on berries, and on grassland and field margins looking for worms, slugs, leatherjackets and sometimes grain.

We would be very interested to learn about the wildlife (be it birds, mammals, fish, butterflies, reptiles, amphibians etc, common or unusual) you've seen locally. Please send details of sightings to us at the email addresses below. We are fortunate to have a wide range of habitats around the Parish (woodland, meadows, heath, streams etc) and it would be good to build up a picture of the wildlife resources we have in the area.

BERE REGIS HISTORY SOCIETY

WHEN WATER MAINS CAME TO BERE REGIS

Right up until the mid-1950s everybody at Bere Regis got their water from wells, water buts or the river and this was admirably documented in John England's book "Well Well Well" of 2012.



There were almost 100 wells in the parish, but Mains Water was finally established here between late 1954 and early 1956. The History Society has found fragments of concrete water pipe, 11.5 inches in diameter and 8 inches internal diameter, in locations which suggest that it originally came in from the West. The immediate places connected were Shitterton, West Street, North Street, then Southbrook and Rye Hill. The Bere Heath and Hyde areas of the parish didn't get connected until the late 1970s. The village connection, in particular from 1955, resulted in most houses wanting their own internal bathrooms and toilets installed.



Houses connected initially were those that had paid a small connection fee, but there were still some, with their own plumbing expertise, who dug across to the mains pipe, in the night, and made their own connection to the pipes, and reportedly, "never paid no nothing". To ease the need for high-pressure supply, a reservoir was built on the SW end of Black Hill in 1957 and completed in the Spring of 1958. The final part of the system was carried out in 1967 to 1969 when sewerage pipes were buried all around the

main streets of the village.

The main contractor was a firm called Tilbury-Maidment, whose lorries and dumper-trucks had distinctive orange livery and were manned by very entertaining Irish "navvies" who brought their own good-humoured repartee to the village for many months. For most houses it meant an end to Septic Tanks to take the waste, but for those in the lower-lying areas of the village, that system still remains.

WILD WOODBURY

Another busy month at Wild Woodbury has flown by, with a lot happening across the site. I was thrilled by the response for volunteers to help on site, we have a long list of people who are keen to get involved in both practical work and surveying, and I'm hoping we can get started up very soon after the New Year. Do still get in touch with the DWT if you would like to volunteer on site at all, I will be able to fit you into the plans!

Some of the contracted surveyors have already been hard at work, with soil scientists out on site for a week in late November. They've been collecting hundreds of core samples, to help us understand the chemical make up of the soil we're working with and to see how it might change over time. The preliminary results show a range of compositions across the fields, fairly indicative of the intensive land management that has happened over the past decades. In addition to soil sampling, we have also received spatial information about the water courses on site, which is vital knowledge for when we begin water monitoring in the New Year, and when deciding how best to re-naturalise the hydrology across Wild Woodbury.

As well as water and soil, other site surveys are also beginning to get underway. I'm a trainee bird ringer, and in early December, I went out with a few members of the Stour Ringing Group to survey the site for ground -roosting birds and night-time feeding birds. Equipped with a thermal imager, large torch, and fishing net, we covered several fields at Wild Woodbury and found species including Woodcock (pictured), Jack Snipe, Skylark, and many others. We ring these birds to gain valuable information about migration patterns and movements, population numbers and breeding success. This data enables changes (population decline, for example) to be seen, and conservation



measures to be put in place to aid the bird's survival.

I hope everyone had a good Christmas and New Year, I look forward to meeting many of you in 2022!

We are holding our breath to see what happens, a lockdown, or will we have Christmas? Last year we could still go for walks outside with the rule of six. Humans must now try and stay at home for work and yet we can go to Christmas parties. Doesn't make sense but I don't think the Government can afford to keep bailing out the hospitality and entertainment business. The humans are back in Muzzles (face masks) and frequently wash their paws. Many humans are very unhappy about the return to restrictions. There is much debate about it on TV and how many parties were held in Downing Street last year?

My owner takes the view as she has now been triple vaccinated, she can take care and carry on. We are not yet back to zoom coffee mornings and we go for Coffee at the Royal Oak where I get biscuits. Wood fuel

Harmful levels of air pollution can damage people's health and reduce their quality of life. We can all be affected by this, but some, especially children, older people, and those with respiratory problems, can be affected most.



While only 8% of homes use log burners, they are now the biggest cause of a particular type of particulate matter smaller than 2.5 microns across. These are tiny, generally the human eye can see debris and dust that are only approximately 25 microns in size. It's these tiny particles that can enter the bloodstream which can potentially cause serious health issues for those most susceptible to them. As the popularity of log burners has grown the amount of this type of particulate has increased, it's more than doubled since 2003.

Therefore, in the first changes to what consumers can burn in their home for 70 years the UK government has introduced the Air Quality Regulations 2020. This new law restricts the sale of wet wood which when burnt produces more tiny particles than seasoned or dry wood. Banning the sale of wet wood should help improve air quality for all.

Wood fuel can now only be sold in volumes of less than 2 cubic metres if it is certified as 'Ready to Burn'. This confirms it has a moisture content of 20% or less. It applies to both firewood and wood briquettes sold in single retail bags or supplied as a bulk delivery in loose volumes of less than 2 cubic metres. Traders are also required to store the wood in such a way that it is not sold to customers damaged or wet.



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REAL RESCUES

For those of you who have been following my musings in this magazine you will remember that last month I told story of my day filming with Robson Green at the Tinside Lido in Plymouth. We also had another day in Dover in preparation for his Wild Swimming film to be shown on ITV later in the autumn of 2009.

There is a sequel to this tale which gives a very different take on two separate stories.

After the filming with Robson I sat back and waited with bated breath for my TV appearance later in the autumn. As the programme progressed, it soon became clear that the director had a tale to tell and the devil was in the detail or in this case in the editing. My friend Dave (my swimming partner in this swimming odyssey) was definitely the straight guy answering all Mr Green's questions with clarity and gusto. Any sensible contribution I made during a long interview was very skilfully edited out. The only line that I uttered in the whole film was when the three of us were required to swim past a bevy of Plymouth beauties. Robson said "Come on Bob, say something" to which I replied "If we look as if we are in trouble, will they jump in and save us?" I was surely Eric and Dave most certainly Ernie!

The family was incensed and our daughter Miranda even wrote to the great man expressing her displeasure. I took a little more philosophical view, having realised that as I have got older it paid not to take myself too seriously.

We now fast-forward a couple of years to the spring of 2011. Another of my great pleasures in life is walking and | had been a member of the Casterbridge Ramblers for a number of years. I was out on the Purbeck hills recceing a walk that I was to lead the following week. I had parked the car at Worth Matravers, walked along the Priest's Way ridge and was descending the hill from Spyway Barn to Dancing Ledge when it happened. The stone steps were wet and unbeknown to me, very slippery and I found myself going 'base over apex', landing in an untidy heap.

The pain was immediate but it was not until I had composed myself enough to look down that I saw that I was in a bit of trouble. My foot was at a right angle to my leg and there was blood seeping from an open wound from the ankle. To compound my problems, I was on my own and I could not get a mobile signal because of my location. I did try hauling myself further down the slope nearer to the south west coast path but this proved hopeless.

Whilst I waited there thinking what to do next I decided to move my foot into what I thought was a better position by yanking it on its axis. There was a bit of a grinding noise as I did so but I was told later that this bit of amateur surgery benefited the circulation in my foot and may have even saved it.

Fortunately for me I saw another couple of walkers 300/400 yards further down the ridge and after what seemed an age, managed to attract their attention. One stayed with me whilst the other ran to the top of the hill to get a signal.

Within 20 minutes a coastguard helicopter from Portland was hovering overhead and a land ambulance appeared. What was to follow was almost surreal. Not only did the crew and paramedics from the helicopter appear on the scene but also a television cameraman from the BBC's Real Rescues programme. Would I mind him filming my rescue? I was so pleased to see them all I am sure I would have agreed to anything!

It was a cold wet day so after removing my boot and sock and assessing the damage, they quickly wrapped me in warm blankets and lifted me onto a stretcher. One of the paramedics said to me after giving me a shot of morphine: "On a scale of 1 to 10 how would you rate your pain level?". "Oh, about 8," I replied. "You're a very brave man," he said, to which I quickly retorted: "But it was nearer 13 before you gave me that stuff!"

I was quickly stretchered to the helicopter for the short flight to Poole General Hospital for a two-and-a-half-hour operation that evening. May I say how brilliantly professional the aircrew, paramedics and hospital staff were. I know it has been said many times before, but we should be very proud of our NHS and the fantastic service it provides.

I was to make slow but steady progress over the coming weeks. It would take me six months to get back walking over rough terrain again as first my bones and then my ligaments repaired.

A couple of months after my accident I was invited by the BBC to go to the police headquarters in Abingdon where the Real Rescues programme was being filmed. I was to be interviewed by the lovely Louise Minchin who has iust retired after 20 years of hosting the Breakfast Show. Nick Knowles was there to do the voice over on my rescue. This was all very exciting but as you will imagine after my previous experience of appearing on national



television, I was a little apprehensive about the final result.

Louise and the camera crew sat me down for my interview and it went without a
